

"The Man We All Loved"

(The following is the entire eulogy delivered by the Rev. Dennis B. McCarthy, O.P., Ph.D., vicar superior of the Dominican community at the college, at the funeral services in St. Pius' Church, Monday, of the Rev. Jeremiah T. Fitzgerald, O.P., vice-president of the college, who died unexpectedly Saturday.)

"May the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ keep me unto eternal life." These words, taken from the Dominican Missal, are prounced in each Mass by the priest, just before he receives the Holy

your Excellency, Monsignori, Very Reverend Reverend Fathers, Religious Brothers, Esteemed Sisters, Federal, State and Civic Dignitaries, Members of the Providence College Alumni Association, Members of the Student Body of Providence College, and friends:

In a ceremony of the sort for which we have gathered here this morning, there is always a mingling of emotions. For the death of one of God's priests is an occasion of sadness, mixed with a triumphant joy. of God's priests is an occasion of sadness, mixed with a triumphant joy. We grieve because one who was so familiar we will see on earth no more; somewhat selfishly we count our loss; but we recognize in the midst of our sorrow that in a larger sense our loss is our deceased brother's gain, that he has fought the good fight to the end, that he has finised a difficult course, that he has kept the faith undiminished, and that at last he has merited the Crown of Justice which the Lord, the Just Judge, renders to his priests who persevere in faithful service.

For in the maintenance of His priesthood, God's selecting hand reaches into this family and that, and, in a process mysterious to man, chooses those who are to set themselves apart in order that, while

chooses those who are to set themselves apart in order that, while bringing the means of salvation to others, they may find salvation for themselves. By no human right, but purely through God's bounty, these men, marked by God with an invisible sign, are singled out from their fellow men, and are privileged to stand before the high altar as ministers of the August Sacrifice, to preach with authority the doctrine of the Divine Preacher, to dispense those channels of God's grace, the Sacraments, and to act in all capacities in the Name of the Most Exalted and the Most High.

the feeble light of human wisdom alone, the lives of such men are a divine contradiction. They must handle sin, and strive to keep themselves unsullied; fully aware of their human weaknesses and limitations, they must find the courage to challenge the forces of evil; and while their hearts wish to pray "O Lord, I am not worthy," they must say, in the confident words of the great Apostle, "I can do all things,

Him who strengtheneth me!"

It was to assure with greater certainty, if God so willed, that his people might be kept secure and guided more safely on the path of grace and that at the same time, God's priest might find new strength for their tasks, that the apostolic St. Dominic more than 700 years ago banded his followers together in the Order he founded. They sought banded his blookers together in the Order he founded. They sought to perfect God's work in themselves and in those whom they served, by three pledges; they pledged themselves to poverty, and in return found the riches of mutual support and brotherhood in community life; they vowed themselves to chastity in full priestly fashion; they swore (Continued on Page 2)

Long known as a forceful indepen dent in political thinking and a tire-less exponent of the liberal arts education, Dr. Henry M. Wriston has been president for the past two years of the Association of American Universities, a group of 37 of the country's most prominent universities, which attempts to identify and solve educational probfrom the Rockefeller Foundation and the Carnegie Corporation of New York, the Association is embarked on a study of the financing of all types of higher education in the United



New Monstrance Received At College For Use In Grotto


struction was made possible by the generous contribution of old rings, watches, and trinkets by the friends of Providence College, was received here last week by the Rev. Charles H. McKenna, O.P., Chaplain of the

Designed to fit into the massive scheme of the War Memorial Grotto, the monstrance is the work of John Hardy, one of the country's outstanding designers of church and altar furnishings, who executed the strikingly original and appropriate design.

The monstrance, ornamented with gold and silver and inlaid with precious stones, is 45% inches high, weighs 17 pounds, and is valued at nearly \$10,000.

The design portrays the intimate relationship between Christ and His Blessed Mother, between the devo tion to the Eucharist and to the Rosary. Like our faith itself, the general motif of this ostensorium is cruciform, and to this has been add-ed the eight-pointed star of St. Domenic, founder of the Dominican Or-

The ears of wheat embossed there-on recall the Bread of Life in the Sacrament of the Eucharist. The Mystical Rose still surrounds her Son's flesh as he reposes, awaiting to bless and protect us. The life cycle of our Redeemer is symbolized by the octagonal border as cherubs support fif-



Today we pay tribute to such a priest. Father Jeremiah Thomas Fitzgerald, born into a distinguished Washington family, for forty-two years wore with honor the white habit of a Friar Preacher. For thirty-six years he performed the great sacrifice of the Altar, and thousands of times, before administering to himself the Precious Body and Blood of Christ, he prayed that those Sacred Elements might keep him unto eternal life. For thirty years he was a conscientious teacher in the class-rooms of Providence College. For nineteen years he was a Vice-President of that institution, and no one appreciates better than the four Presidents under whom he served, how selfless and how willing was his devotion in that office. devotion in that office


Two days before he died he was seen preparing his final lectures; and on Friday, he taught the last class of the current year. On Saturday morning, he arose earlier than usual to celebrate Mass, but feeling somewhat unwell, he waited until his distress had passed, and three hours later he did what he was determined to do, honor God again at His altar. Everything to which he had devoted so many years was finished, and then he "gave his soul unto his Captain, Christ, under whose banner he had fought so long."

Two weeks ago a reception was tendered to Father Fitzgerald by the Senior Class of Providence College. They honored him for his long years of service and hailed him spontaneously as "the man we all love." He was indeed loved by the students for whom he worked in his last year as he did in his first. He was truly loved by the members of his community, who knew him as a man of humility, loyalty, and of exemplary charity. No one can recall an unkind word that passed his lips. He was loved and admired by many groups to whom he gave generously of his time and of his diminishing energy in addresses and speeches.

So in sorrow, we rejoice. We feel sure that St. Thomas Aquinas will plead for this teacher who also bore the name Thomas. We are confident that Our Lady, Queen of the Rosary, will shelter her devoted son. And we have an abiding trust that the Body and Blood of Our Lord Jesus Christ will keep unto eternal life the man we all loved.


