
Ricardo Lagos was a leading figure in the opposition movement to the dictatorship of Augusto Pinochet in Chile, including denouncing the human rights abuses of dictatorship on national television and spearheading a campaign that used an electoral referendum to call for a democratic transition. As President from 2000 to 2006, Lagos oversaw numerous economic and social reforms, including the publication of the 2004 Valech Report publicizing Pinochet-era human rights abuses as a culmination of Chile's transitional justice process.
