

Eva Marie Pacheco a RI native has been the owner and Director of the Providence Ballet established in June of 1995 and its satellite school Providence Ballet @ Aim High Academy in East Greenwich RI as of 1998; she joined the Dance faculty at RI College in 2004 and Brown University the spring of 2008. She is Artistic Director of the Providence Ballet Theatre which made its performance debut in the fall of 2008, and the Providence Youth Ballet established in 2004. A Rhode Island native she was a founding member of Festival Ballet under the Direction of Christine Hennesey and Winthrop Cory. Performing with the Island Moving Company of Newport, RI for the past 13 years, she toured with the Everett Dance Theatre in The Science Project, and Body of Work. She can also be found working with Colleen Cavanaugh, of Providence, RI and carolsomersDANCE of Boston, MA. As a choreographer, she has created several works for Festival Ballet, including Los Caminos and In the Mood, for IMC, most recently Je Ne Regrette Rein. Eva Marie's first full-length Ballet Twas the Night before Christmas, premiered in December 1995 with IMC. In the winter of 2002 she was instrumental in mounting A Newport Nutcracker at Rosecliff for the IMC which is still performed to a capacity audience every year. Eva Marie was a visiting Artist and created a work for Rhode Island College in the fall of 2008. Her greatest accomplishment to date by far are her children Sara and Michael.

Michelle Struckholz received her B.S. in Dance from James Madison University in 1997. Michelle then ventured to New York City where she studied ballet with Jackie Villamil, modern with David Dorfman, Kevin Wynn and many others, and performed with CORA. Two years later, Michelle landed and stayed in San Francisco for 10 years and had the pleasure of working with Kathleen Hermesdorf and Albert Mathias of Motion Lab, Company Mecanique Dance Theatre, Annie Rosenthal and Company, David Dorfman Dance, and EmSpace Dance. Michelle teaches modern dance technique classes at Motion Center and The Spot, and is also a certified personal fitness trainer. Michelle hopes to get many more people moving and dancing in Providence.

Jamie Jewett is the director of Lostwax Productions, a multi-media dance theater company that seeks to examine the visceral cusp between installation, performance space and narrative through the use of technology. Jewett has choreographed, performed and taught across the U.S. as well as in Bali, Canada, France, Java, Nepal and the United Kingdom. He has been an artist in residence at HERE Center for the Arts in New York City (2003-2005) and STEIM in Amsterdam (2006). Jamie received his BA in Dance and Buddhist Studies from Naropa University, an MFA in Dance and Technology from the Ohio State University, an MA from Brown University's MEME@Brown program (Multimedia and Electronic Music Experiments @ Brown). He completed his PhD in New Media and Performance at Brown University in 2008. Currently he is working on a feature length site-specific film adaptation of his piece MELT. Jewett is also an Artist in Residence at Perishable Theater and has just received a major commission from the Ammeran Center for Art and Technology at Connecticut College to work on a new evening length work BLINKING.www.lostwax.org

Wendy Oliver is Professor of Dance and Chair of the Dept. of Theatre, Dance, and Film at PC. After graduating from college, she moved to New York City and studied with famed modern dance choreographer Merce Cunningham and his company. Many of the dance and choreography exercises she learned there are integrated into the choreography for *Tribute to Cunningham and Cage*. After leaving New York, she danced in Minnesota with the dance company Contactworks, touring and teaching in the Upper Midwest. She has an MFA from Temple University, and an EdD from Columbia University. Oliver directs the PC Dance Company and the dance minor program. Oliver received the National Dance Association's Scholar/Artist Award in 2008, and has edited two dance textbooks for that organization. Her own book, Writing about Dance, will be published this spring by Human Kinetics Press.

A great inspiration to the process for this work, Jack Kerouac's Belief & Technique for Modern Prose and Essentials of Spontaneous Prose provides guidelines for writing essentially. The rules have been adapted to the realm of movement by the choreographer. The halkus were written by Jack Kerouac. The dancers have contributed significantly to the vocabulary of this dance, and will continue to 'jam' on these poems in performance.

Biographies

Lise Brody is currently on the faculty in the MFA program in Interdisciplinary Arts at Goddard College and is director of residencies at The Yard, an artists' retreat and performing arts presenting organization on Martha's Vineyard. She has been presenting her choreography and performance art for more than 20 years, and formed her company, Screech to a Stop, in 2006. Karen Campbell called her work "brave, provocative and resonant" and "engrossing and affecting" in the Boston Herald, and Debra Cash of the Boston Globe named her an "original presence." She has been an invited participant and performer in two collaborative institutes with the Liz Lerman Dance Exchange and was a long-time member of Back Porch Dance, an intergenerational women's dance company. She has taught at Rhode Island College and Emerson College, and was a high school teacher for 11 years. She received an MFA in dance from California Institute of the Arts and has studied choreography and performance art with Bessie Schönberg, Guillermo Gomez-Peña and Coco Fusco, Celeste Miller, and Theresa Chavez.

Nikki Carrara is a dancer, choreographer, and dance educator. A recent resident artist at both AS220 and Perishable Theatre, she relishes collaborative opportunities with artists of various disciplines. Her choreography has been presented throughout the region, in theatres, art galleries, and fields, by The Dance Complex, Perishable Theatre, Rhode Island College, Andary Dance, DoubleShift Dance Theatre, and Island Moving Company, among many others. Her most recent evening-length work, Interface, was recently shown as a work-in-progress under the RAPT (Resident Artists at Perishable Theatre) program, and will be fully produced in 2010. Ms Carrara teaches various forms and topics of dance, which she has been fascinated by for over two decades, offering ongoing and master classes in the private sector as well as through community arts organizations and public education.
