Originally choreographed in 1955, "Rooms" is about isolation in a big city. Dance writer Don McDonagh says: "The dance has a muted and at times overt air of desperation. All of the people shown attempt to escape from the isolation of their psychic "rooms" but none succeeds. The interest of the dance lies in the integrity and the imaginative failures that each is doomed to endure...The movement owes much to jazz in the accents and ritards of its execution, presenting the tragic in syncopation." (The Dance Encyclopedia, NY: Doubleday, 1976, p.258)

*Notes

Two of the dances in this show are part of a larger project created by the directors at four Rhode Island colleges and universities: Kelli Wicke Davis of Roger Williams University, Dante Del Guidice of Rhode Island College, Julie Strandberg of Brown University, and Wendy Oliver of Providence College. The project has included three residencies by Danny Buraczeski and his dancers, each of which has involved students from all of the colleges. The first residency, held during January break, was dedicated to reconstructing Jack Cole's "Happy Endings Every Time" from the 1951 movie *On the Riviera*.

The second residency, held during February, involved creating and teaching a new duet that is now part of the American Dance Legacy's "Etude Repertory Collection." Repertory Etudes, short dances based on quintessential elements of a choreographer's style, are made available to dancers for ongoing study and performance. The collection is curated by Carolyn Adams and Julie A. Strandberg.

The third residency occurred during March, and involved a panel discussion at P.C. entitled "Tradition and Innovation in Jazz Dance: From Jack Cole to Danny Buraczeski." The purpose of all of the residencies was to increase knowledge of an appreciation for the jazz dance genre in the state of Rhode Island. Buraczeski's Company, Jazz Dance, also performed at Rhode Island College.

These two dances were made possible by the National Endowment for the Arts, New England Foundation for the Arts, Dance USA, and Providence College. Additional support was given by Rhode Island College/ Performing Arts Series, Rhode Island College Dance Department, Brown University and Roger Williams University.

Choreographer Biographies

Danny Buraczeski - Buraczeski draws on a background in ballet, modern and jazz dance, coupled with his appreciation for America's jazz music heritage. His formal explorations, intense musicality, and distinctive point of view distinguish him as one of the most original voices working in the form today. After a career on Broadway, appearing in such musicals as *Mame* with Angela Landsbury and *The Act* with Liza Minellli, he formed the original JAZZDANCE in 1979.In 1989, he relocated to Minneapolis/St. Paul and merged his company with Zenon Dance Company, where he served as Artistic Co-Director and Resident Jazz Choreographer. The association ended in the summer of 1992 and Mr. Buraczeski re-formed JAZZDANCE in the Twin Cities. This company made its debut at the O'Shaughnessy Auditorium in St. Paul in the spring of 1993.

Jack Cole (1911-1974) - Following Cole's early career performing with the pioneering modern dance companies of Denishawn and Humphrey Weidman in the 1930's, he began choreographing for Broadway and night clubs. In the 1940's, he moved to Hollywood and through the heyday of the American musical traveled between both coasts. Recognized as a pioneer in development of American jazz dance, his choreography on Broadway and in films for stars such as Gene Kelly, Cyd Charisse, Betty Grable, Marilyn Monroe, and Gwen Verdon is seminal. He established the first and only professional dance company on a Hollywood studio lot - The Jack Cole Cinema Dance Workshop at Columbia pictures in the 1940's. He was also one of the first choreographers given control of the camera. Mr. Cole's choreography and direction of it maintain an integrity of intent and style rarely found in film to this day.

Heidi Henderson - Henderson comes from Skowhegan, Maine, and she received her B.A. from Colby College and her M.F.A. from Smith College. She has danced in the companies of Bebe Miller, Nina Wiener, Peter Schmitz, Sondra Loring, and Paula Josa-Jones. Her own work has been performed in New York City, Boston, Rhode Island, and at Jacob*s Pillow Inside/Out Festival. She was the 2000 recipient of the Rhode Island State Council on the Arts Fellowship in Choreography, and she has taught nationally and internationally as a member of the Bebe Miller Company and Nina Wiener Company. She currently teaches at Roger Williams University in Bristol, Rhode Island. Choreography by Heidi Henderson is featured by elephant jane, a new Rhode Island based modern dance company.

Martha Lively - Lively received her associates degree in performing arts from Dean College. She has studied with Alwin Nikolais and Murray Louis, and has completed classes at the Laban/Bartinieff Institute in Movement Analysis in New York City. In 1993 she co-founded "Kids Community Dance Project" and "Movement Together" which have been recognized by the New York State Department of Health as outstanding programs that involved the community with dance. For the past five years she has directed dance programs for public and private schools in Western Massachusetts and in Vermont. She has also performed in and around New York City, Northampton and Boston, MA.

Deb Meunier - Meunier is the Artistic Director of Fusionworks, a Rhode Island dance company founded in 1987. Her works have been commissioned and performed throughout the Northeast including Rhode Island College, Brown University, WORKS Contemporary Dance of Hartford, Jacob's Pillow, Dance Services Network, Artspace of New Haven, and the 92nd Street YMCA of New York City, among others. In 1996, she received a choreography fellowship from the RI Council on the Arts; she has

also received a Cirino Fellowship for her work in arts education, and the Rulewater Prize from Wesleyan University for her work on an interdisciplinary choreographic residency with the RI School for the Deaf. Meunier also runs Fusionworks Dance Academy in Lincoln, RI.

Wendy Oliver, MFA, EdD - Oliver is an Associate Professor of Dance, and has been teaching and choreographing at Providence College since 1985. Prior to becoming a member of the faculty, she performed with the Minneapolis based company Contactworks. Her choreography has been performed in New York, Philadelphia, Providence, and throughout Minnesota and the Upper Midwest. She is a past recipient of grants for choreography from the National Endowment for the Arts and the Minnesota State Arts Board. She recently co-edited a book entitled Women Making Art: Women in Visual, Literary and Performing Arts since 1960, which was published in 2001 by Peter Lang Press. She is currently working on a dance textbook for middle and high school students.

Kathleen Ridlon - Ridlon, a graduate from the Alvin Ailey American Dance Center Certificate Program, an MFA from Smith College in Performance and Choreography. She began working professionally as a dancer, teacher, and choreographer in New York City in 1986, where she founded and directed Kid's Community Dance Project and Movement Together from 1993-1995. In the Boston area, she choreographed and co-produced *Curve 9: A Space Musical*, worked with Kidstock and Winchester High School as the choreographer for *Children of Eden*, co-produced an evening of original dance work at Green Street Studios. Currently, Ms. Ridlon is a member of Stage Source in Boston and teaches Dance at the College of the Holy Cross and Providence College.

Anna Sokolow (1910-2000) - Sokolow was born in Hartford. Connecticut and began her training at the Neighborhood Playhouse with Martha Graham and Louis Horst. During this period she formed her own dance company, Players' Project, and began choreographing and performing solo concerts and ensemble works. Sokolow was very concerned with social problems and included a vast array of social commentary within her works. She also greatly contributed to dance and theater in Mexico and Israel with her skills as a choreographer and teacher. Sokolow received many honors and awards throughout her lifetime, including Honorary Doctorate degrees from Ohio State University, Brandeis University and Boston Conservatory of Music. She received a Fulbright Fellowship to Japan, National Endowment for the Arts' Choreographic Fellowship, the Lifetime Achievement Award from the American/Israeli Cultural Foundation, and the Encomienda, Aztec Eagle Honor (the highest civilian award awarded to a foreigner by Mexico).
