



Pantalone returns to find his money taken and faints; the doctor is brought to revive him and a chase ensues.

Guest Artists and Faculty

David Harper After completing his undergraduate work at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, David Harper went on to earn a Masters of Music from Virginia Commonwealth University. He continued his studies at Boston University, as Dean's Scholar, earning a second Master degree from the School of Music in 1994. graduating with top honors. He is a member of the prestigious Pi Kappa Lambda music society. As a pianist, his teachers include Daniel Ericourt and Anthony di Bonaventura, and he has studied the techniques of vocal coaching under Diane Richardson at The Julliard School. He has accompanied such illustrious singers as Richard Cassilly and Patricia Craig in concert, and has twice been chosen to participate in the prestigious Cleveland Art Song Festival, where he worked with such artists as Warren Jones, Roger Vignoles, Olaf Bär and Sarah Walker. Mr. Harper has held teaching positions at both the New England Conservatory Boston University School of Music and Rhode Island College, and is currently Coordinator of Vocal Studies and Special Lecturer in the Department of Music at Providence College in Rhode Island.

Sean Keating attended The University of Texas at Austin where he studied lighting and scenery design. He has worked in theaters around the country including Trinity Repertory Company where he designed lighting for several shows including the first production of "A Christmas Carol" He was also the Production Manager for The American Conservatory Theatre of San Francisco, California. This is Sean's fourth production for Providence College.

Kathleen Ridlon is a graduate of the Alvin Ailey American Dance Center Certificate Program and has an MFA from Smith College in Performance and Choreography. Ms. Ridlon began working professionally as a dancer, teacher, and choreographer in New York City in 1986, where she founded and directed Kid's Community Dance Project and Movement Together from 1993-1995. In the Boston area, she choreographed and co-produced Curve 9: A Space Musical, worked with Kidstock and Winchester High School as the choreographer for Children of Eden, co-produced an evening of original dance work at Green Street Studios. Currently, Ms. Ridlon is a member of Stage Source in Boston and teaches dance at the College of the Holy Cross and Providence College.

Wendy Oliver, MFA, EdD, Associate Professor of Dance, has been teaching and choreographing at PC since 1985. Prior to joining the faculty here, she performed with the Minneapolis-based company Contactworks. Her choreography has been performed in New York, Philadelphia, Providence and throughout Minnesota and the Upper Midwest. She is a past recipient of grants for choreography from the National Endowment for the Arts and the Minnesota State Arts Board. She co-edited a book entitled Women Making Art: Women in the Visual, Literary, and Performing Arts since 1960, published by Peter Lang Press, and is currently editing a dance textbook for middle and high school students.

Angelica Vessella is currently the owner/director of the Neon Dance Theatre in North Providence, and she is an adjunct faculty member at Rhode Island college where she teaches jazz dance. Angelica has performed at Jacob's Pillow for Mary Paula Hunter, and in 1992 she worked with Marata Renzi and the Project Dance Company in New York City. Angelica has choreographed several works for the Rhode Island College Dance Company, Community College of Rhode Island, and Providence College. She also worked as rehearsal director for Danny Buraczeski's adaptation of Jack Cole's historical work Happy Endings Every Time. In 2002, Angelica was the recipient of the Rhode Island College Alumni Honor Roll award for excellence in the field of dance.

Commedia dell' Arte

Commedia' dell Arte began in the early to mid-1500's in Italy as a form of street theatre in which masked actors played well-defined stock characters. Using a basic plot or scenario, the actors improvised much of the action and dialogue, whose purpose was to entertain through buffoonery, satire, or vulgarity. Music and acrobatics also played a part in the Commedia. Although the plot changed from play to play, the characters remained constant, making it easier for audiences to understand the action. Commedia remained popular until the 1700's, when it was replaced by other forms of theatre. Some of the stock characters (and the ones found in our play-within-a-dance) are discussed here.

Pantalone, is a wealthy employer with servants, giving orders, controlling the social structure. He is stingy, selfish, unhappy, and unhealthy.

Harlequin usually plays Pantalone's servant, and is in love with Columbina. Early versions of his character were quick physically and slow mentally; he became more clever as he developed over the decades. He generally carries a batocchio, or "slapstick," which is two thin pieces of wood fastened together in such a way that they can slap against one another; this is the origin of our term "slapstick comedy." Harlequin uses this stick as a "weapon" or noisemaker for comic effect. We have not included the slapstick in this dance for practical reasons.

Brighella can take the part of a high status servant, an inkeeper, or jack-of-all trades. He is rarely a victim, and usually maintains the upper hand in dealings with others.

Columbina usually plays a clever maid who uses her wits to further the plot. Although flirtatious, she is good at her job and careful with money. She is in love with Harlequin but is very aware of his faults.

Il Dottore (the Doctor) is prone to talk too much about everything, and was originally created as a character satirizing Bolognese scholars. He often brags of his abilities to cure and thinks highly of himself.

Corallina/Isabella usually plays Pantalone's daughter. She is both flirtatious and stubborn, and generally is able to manipulate her father.


Providence College Plans New Center for the Arts

The performing arts are thriving at Providence College with steadily increasing student participation in Music, Theater, Dance, and Film programs and a new Music Education Degree Major. Currently, the spaces used for performance and practice rooms, classrooms, and related activities are scattered throughout the campus and are inadequate. To better accommodate this growing and important facet of the Providence College educational experience, the college has committed to build a major new campus facility...a Center for the Arts building. The proposed building will house the Department of Music and the Department of Theatre, Dance, and Film and contain two 300-seat performance spaces, along with the full range of related teaching, rehearsal, and production facilities.

Dennis Keefe Associates of Boston, Massachusetts, the same architectural firm that designed the highly acclaimed St. Dominic Chapel, has been commissioned to design the building. Preliminary exterior and interior design plans have already been drafted and are under review by a special committee. The committee, which includes students, faculty, and staff is working with the architects to develop the final design for the 2.5 story, 54,400 square foot building.

The proposed site for the new building is the lower campus area along Eaton Street where outdoor tennis courts are now located. The main entrance of the center will open onto a new landscaped campus quad abutting Fennel Hall and Howley Hall. The back of the building will be parallel with Eaton Street. New parking areas will be clustered to maximize green space and incorporate existing trees. A total cost of \$17 million is anticipated for the project. Approximately \$4 million will come from the College's capital budget. The balance of the funding is being sought from individual, foundation, and corporate contributions and government grants. The groundbreaking and construction schedule will be dictated by the progress of assembling funding commitments for the project. It is hoped that work might begin before the end of 2003.

Fund-raising is already underway and commemorative opportunities are available. For more information contact Joseph Brum, Vice President for Alumni/Development at (401)865-2416.
