

Peter Shaffer playwright

Peter Shaffer was born a twin on May 15, 1926 in Liverpool, England. In 1936 his family moved to London where he finished school and then went to work in a coal mine. He left the hard life of mining for Trinity College at Cambridge University to study history, but after graduation, tried his hand at writing, instead. Some of his first works were detective novels, two of which he co-authored with his twin brother.

In 1951 Shaffer moved to New York and spent time working a number of different jobs in order to make ends meet. He quickly developed a passion for theatre, but for many years he was under the misconception that it could only be used as a pastime rather than a lucrative career. Unsure how to make a place for himself in the theatrical hub of New York, Shaffer returned to London in 1954 to work for a music publisher. The following year Shaffer wrote his first television play, *The Salt Land*, which met with great success. In 1958 Shaffer's first play for the stage, *Five Finger Exercise* opened in London. This too was a success and won the New York Drama Critics' Circle Award for Best Foreign Play of the 1959-60 season.

After this, Shaffer's career in the theatre world took off. He went on to write many short comedies, screenplays, and major stage plays. *Amadeus* won a Tony Award for Best Play in 1981, as well as an Evening Standard Award, Theatre Critics Award, and an Outer Critics Circle Award. In 1984 Shaffer's film adaptation of *Amadeus* won an Oscar for Best Screenplay. His other work includes *Black Comedy*, *Lettice and Lovage*, and *Equus*.

Resident and Visiting Artists

Katherine C. Abernathy (Lighting Design)

Kathy's lighting experience encompasses both architectural and theatrical lighting design. Some of her theatrical design credits include: Seagull at Providence College, The Who's Tommy, The Art of Dining, Brighton Beach Memoirs, all at Rhode Island College: Antigone, Extremities, and To Kill a Mockingbird all at Theatre Project Company St. Louis. MO; Canterbury Tales and Clouds in Croydon, England. Kathy holds a BFA in Stage Design from Webster University and earned a Post Graduate Certificate of Merit from Croydon College in London, England. This past fall Kathy had the honor of teaching Interior Lighting Design at RISD. Other guest lecture credits for Theatrical Lighting Techniques in Architectural Lighting include the Boston Design Center, the University of Missouri at Kansas City, Maryville College and Rhode Island College. Kathy is in her 6th year with the test committee for the National Council on Qualification of Lighting Professions (NCOLP) as well as a member of the United States Institute for Theatre Technology (USITT) and the Designers Lighting Forum (DLF) of New England. Kathy serves the on the Board of the International Association of Lighting Designers as Director at Large.

David Costa-Cabral (Costume Design)

David Costa-Cabral is an Associate Professor of Theater here at Providence College where he is the Resident Scenic and Costume Designer as well as a full-time professor. David received his MFA in Theater Design from Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Texas. His designs for the stage have included works for the Publick Theatre, The New York International Fringe Festival, The Boston Conservatory and The Green Mountain Guild, The Walnut Hill School, The Boston Lyric Stage and many others. Among his assorted design credits are *The Tempest* (Providence College), *Follies* (The Boston Conservatory), *The Who's Tommy* (The Walnut Hill School), *Side Show* (The Boston Conservatory) and *A Little Night Music* (The Boston Lyric Stage).

John Garrity (Director)

John Garrity is a member of the Theatre, Dance and Film Department faculty and Managing Director of Theatre at Providence College. He has directed over 30 plays at the college, Two years ago he directed *Murderers* a series of adaptations of the classical Greek plays Iphiginia in Aulis, Electra and Orestes, and last year he directed William Shakespeare's *The Tempest*.

Carl F. Gudenius (Scenic Design)

Carl's last design for Providence College was *Playboy of the Western World* in 1979!(he was a senior Theater Arts major and Blackfriars Scholarship recipient) Between then and now he has been busy de-

signing. He earned a MFA in Production Design from Wayne State University. He has been designing scenery for theater, corporate and special events since 1976 and has also been working as an art director and production designer for television since 1989. Recent design work has included Spirit of America (2001-2005), WWII Tribute to a Generation, 50th Anniversary of the Korean War, and the Army Band Holiday Concert (2001-2004) for the US Army, POTUS Diplomatic Podium and Graphic Support for the office of the president As well as Art Direction for The Democratic Candidate Debates, The Reagan State Funeral, Nightline and Good Morning America for ABC News. His scenic designs for theater have been seen at many theaters ranging from local, regional and national tours. His Television credits include work for ABC. ESPN, CNN, PBS (including 7 years of In Performance at the White House), and C-SPAN networks as well as many local, national and international broadcasts. His corporate design work has covered hundreds of shows and events for such clients as AOL, Pfizer, Sony, HP, MasterCard, Choice Hotels and Barnes & Noble. He is resident designer and board member for The Washington Stage Guild. In addition to his professional design activities he is professor of design for the department of Theater & Dance at The George Washington University in Washington, DC.

David Harper (Vocal Coach and Music Consultant)

After completing his undergraduate work at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, David Harper went on to earn a Master of Music from Virginia Commonwealth University. He continued his studies at Boston University, as Dean's Scholar, earning a second Master degree from the School of Music in 1994, graduating with top honors. He is a member of the Pi Kappa Lambda music society. As a singer, he studied with Richard Cassilly; as a pianist, his teachers include Daniel Ericourt and Anthony di Bonaventura. He has accompanied such illustrious Metropolitan Opera singers as Richard Cassilly and Patricia Craig in concert and has twice been chosen to participate in the prestigious Cleveland Art Song Festival where he worked with such artists as Warren Jones, Roger Vignoles, Olaf Bär and Sarah Walker. David has held teaching positions at both Boston University and Rhode Island College, and is currently Coordinator of Vocal Studies in the Department of Music and Musical Director in the Department of Theatre, Dance and Film at Providence College where he teaches voice class, lyric diction, song repertoire, opera/musical theatre workshop, music in the theatre and music appreciation. At Trinity Repertory Theater in Providence, Rhode Island, David was musical director for the premier of the Richard Cumming opera, The Picnic and in 2004 he served as the assistant musical director for A Christmas Carol. He has also done national tours of To Whom It May Concern by Carol Hall and A Child's

Christmas in Wales by Dylan Thomas. David was the musical director and conductor of Providence College's last season's Carousel, as well as the musical director for Brigadoon in 2005 and Merrily We Roll Along in 2002.

Chris Warren (Sound Design)

Chris Warren has designed sound for several productions at Providence College, including most recently *The Tempest*. He has also done sound design for Perishable Theatre and Brown University as well as a number of documentary short films. He earned a B.A. from Brandeis University and studied sound synthesis at Les Ateliers UPIC in Paris.
