### 1946: a Global Perspective

- Harry S. Truman is President of the United States; King George VI is on the throne in England; Francisco Franco is in power in Spain and Mexico elects its first civilian president, Miguel Alemán.
- Victor Emmanuel III, King of Italy, abdicates and is succeeded by his son, Umberto II. Umberto II leaves the country after Italy is proclaimed a republic and the political structure is restored to a multiparty system.
- In France, a new constitution establishes the Fourth Republic and, having deemed it unsatisfactory, General Charles de Gaulle resigns from public duty. Georges Bidault is elected Prime Minister.
- A civil war begins in China with the Chinese Nationalists, led by Chiang Kai-Shek, in conflict with Mao Tse-Tung and the Communists.
- The first session of the United Nations General Assembly is held in London; New York is subsequently named the permanent headquarters.
- Important composers include Benjamin Britten, Kurt Weill, Gian Carlo Menotti, Arnold Schöenberg, Richard Strauss, Leonard Bernstein, Paul Hindemith, Darius Milhaud, Richard Rodgers, Irving Berlin, Frederick Loewe, Cole Porter, Sergei Prokofiev, Aaron Copland, and Dmitri Shostakovich
- Prominent authors include Albert Camus, Tennesee Williams, Sinclair Lewis, Thomas Mann, Mickey Spillane, Robert Lowell, John Steinbeck, J.B. Priestley, H.E. Bates, John Gunther, Lillian Hellman, Arthur Miller, Jean-Paul Sartre, John Hersey, T.S. Eliot, Norman Mailer, Benjamin Spock, Thornton Wilder, and William Faulkner.
- The eminent names in the world of visual arts include Henry Moore, Alberto Giacometti, Le Corbusier, Oskar Kokoschka, Henri Matisse, Marc Chagall, Georges Braque, Ferdinand Léger, Edward Hopper, Pablo Picasso, Marcel Duchamp, Frank Lloyd Wright, Georges Rouault, Georgia O'Keeffe, Jackson Pollock, and Salvador Dali; and among film directors can be named Cecil B. de Mille, Vincent Minnelli, Alfred Hitchcock, Charlie Chaplin, David Lean, and Roberto Rossellini.

### **Biographies**

#### The Lerner and Loewe Collaborative

Lerner and Loewe were musical geniuses who formed one of the most dynamic duos of all time. The lyricist and composer, respectively, are perhaps best remembered for their musicals *Brigadoon*, *Paint Your Wagon*, *My Fair Lady*, and *Camelot*. These musicals have charmed audiences throughout the years and continue to do so today.

Born into a wealthy Manhattan family, Alan Jay Lerner had the opportunity to study music in some of the finest institutions in the United States, including the Juilliard School of Music and Harvard University. The lyricist began his career writing scripts for radio but soon met composer Frederick Loewe at The Lambs Club, a professional theatrical club in New York City where performers, directors, writers and technicians of the performing arts often gathered to socialize. After this first encounter the two went on to form what would become one of the most successful collaborations in musical theatre history. From the start of their partnership, Lerner wrote both the books and the lyrics to the shows, while Loewe composed the music.

Frederick, "Fritz," Loewe came to the United States from Vienna, Austria in 1924. Before coming to the U.S., Loewe studied in Berlin, Germany with some of the great pianists like Ferruccio Busoni and Eugen d'Albert. Loewe's plan was to come to America and become a famous concert pianist but success in this area did not meet him once he arrived. Instead, he decided to try his hand at writing musicals and in 1937 his first musical production opened in St. Louis called *Salute to Spring*. Then in 1938, he teamed up with lyricist Earle Crooker to create his first Broadway production, *Great Lady*. Unfortunately, neither of these shows was successful. It was while Loewe was in search of a formula that would leave him with a big hit that he met Lerner in 1942. Loewe quickly realized that collaboration with Lerner was precisely the formula needed to create musical success.

However, Lerner and Loewe's first musical endeavors proved to be flops. It wasn't until March 13, 1947 when the Broadway curtain went up on the musical *Brigadoon* that the magic of Lerner and Loewe really began. This delightful musical-comedy about a Scottish village that appears only once every one-hundred years, ran for 581 performances

and has gone on to be revived several times throughout the years. The show won the "Best Musical" award from the New York Drama Critics Circle and a Tony Award for best choreography the year it opened.

The next hit for Lerner and Loewe came in 1951 with *Paint Your Wagon*. The show had a respectable run of 289 performances and was made into a movie with Clint Eastwood in 1969.

Then, on March 15, 1956, Lerner and Loewe's My Fair Lady opened on Broadway. The story of the unrefined flower peddler who blooms into a beautiful and sophisticated lady ran for an unprecedented 2,717 nights over a course of nine years.

Soon after their success with *Camelot* in 1960, Loewe went into retirement. In a tribute to Loewe, Lerner said, "There will never be another Fritz. Writing will never again be as much fun. A collaboration as intense as ours inescapably had to be complex. But I loved him more than I understood or misunderstood him, and I know he loved me more than he understood or misunderstood me." Lerner and Loewe both passed away in the 1980s, but their renowned musical legacy lives on even today.

#### Resident and VisitingArtists

#### Brendan Byrnes - director and choreographer, visiting artist

A resident of New York City, Brendan returns to Providence College as a guest director after directing the Blackfriars productions of *Meet Me in St. Louis* in 1994 and *A Flea in Her Ear* in 2001. Other directing credits include *Baby*, the PC lab production of *Les Liaisons Dangereuses*, and *Lizzie Borden's Tempest*, a new play he both wrote and directed as part of the New York International Fringe Festival.

As an actor, Brendan's credits include the pre-Broadway/regional premiere of the new Burt Bacharach musical, What the World Needs Now with Sutton Foster at the Old Globe Theatre in San Diego, directed by Gillian Lynne and co-produced by the Roundabout Theatre Company, and the off-Broadway production of The Baker's Wife at the Mint Theatre. Regional acting credits include The Lion in Winter with Ed Asner, Rosencrantz and Guildenstern are Dead with Joe Morton and Cotter Smith, True West, Harold Pinter's The Collection (Luna Stage), Cabaret, One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest, Chicago, Amadeus, Big River, The

Drawer Boy (Arrow Rock Lyceum), Falsettos (Gorilla Theatre), Pal Joey (Washington Jewish Theatre), The Boyfriend (Burt Reynolds Theatre), Singin' in the Rain (North Carolina Theatre), and the tours of Gentlemen Prefer Blondes with Loni Anderson and The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas with Barbara Eden.

Brendan recently played "Zoser" in the first regional production of Elton John's Aida, and over ten roles ranging from a WWII amputee to an evil little girl twin in the world premiere of Behind the Scenes at the Museum, adapted from the award-winning novel by Kate Atkinson. Television and film credits include "Oz", "Sex and the City", Box Marley, and Friends & Family. Brendan graduated magna cum laude from the Arts Honors Program at Providence College in 1992, winning the Alembic Award for excellence in creative writing.

#### David Costa-Cabral - costume designer, resident artist

David is an Associate Professor of Theatre, Dance and Film here at Providence College. He joined the department in 1984 and has assumed at various times the tasks of both Department Chair and Managing Director of the Blackfriars Theatre. David received his BA from Rhode Island College in 1977 and his MFA in Theatre Design from Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Texas in 1984. During his twenty-five plus years as a professional designer for the theatre, he has created designs for everything from gowns for the Miss America Pageant, wedding dresses for his students, and clothing for such boutiques as Fiorucci in New York and Boston, the Suzy Creamcheese Store in Las Vegas, and the Sacha Stores in Boston and Providence. His realized designs for the stage have included works at the Publick Theatre, the New York International Fringe Festival, and the Boston Lyric Stage. David worked for approximately fifteen seasons for the Green Mountain Guild in Killington, Vermont. David is regularly guest designer for the Boston Conservatory of Music where in recent productions he has designed Stephen Sondheim's Follies, Kurt Weill's Street Scene, the world premiere's of The Screams of Kitty Genovese and The Captain's Daughter and such classics as The Cherry Orchard, The Tempest and The Good Woman of Szechwan. David was recently nominated and won a Best Costume Design Award presented by the Boston Theatre Critics for two of his designs from last year at the Lyric Stage Company, Noises Off and A Little Night Music.

David was also recently featured and interviewed for the Spring 2005 Issue of The Sondheim Review concerning his methodology and approaches to designing Sondheim for the stage.

#### Quin Gresham - dialect coach, visiting artist

Quin Gresham is an actor and freelance director residing in New York. As an actor Quin has recently appeared regionally as Matthew in Cotton Patch Gospel, Max in Lend Me A Tenor, Sidney in God's Favorite, Rev. Ogelthorpe in Sanders Family Christmas, the Tinman in The Wizard Of Oz, Sam in Shenandoah, Billy Bob in 'Lu Ann Hampton, Marcellus in The Music Man, and Ernst in Cabaret. Other favorites include Gross Indecency and Taming Of The Shrew (Repertory Theatre of St. Louis), You're A Good Man Charlie Brown (Ozark Actors Theatre), Kiss Me Kate (Riverside Theatre), Romeo And Juliet, 1776 (Texas Shakespeare Festival) and Funny Thing Happened On The Way To The Forum. Quin recently directed a production of Oliver and is looking forward to directing productions of Peter Pan and Driving Miss Daisy in the upcoming year.

#### David Harper - musical director, resident artist

After completing his undergraduate work at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, David Harper went on to earn a Master of Music from Virginia Commonwealth University. He continued his studies at Boston University, as Dean's Scholar, earning a second Master degree from the School of Music in 1994, graduating with top honors. He is a member of the Pi Kappa Lambda music society. As a singer, his teachers included Richard Cassilly and Maria Spacagna and as pianist, his teachers include Daniel Ericourt and Anthony di Bonaventura. He has accompanied such illustrious Metropolitan Opera singers as Richard Cassilly and Patricia Craig in concert and has twice been chosen to participate in the prestigious Cleveland Art Song Festival where he worked with such artists as Warren Jones, Roger Vignoles, Olaf Bär and Sarah Walker. David has held teaching positions at both Boston University and Rhode Island College, and is currently Coordinator of Vocal Studies and Special Lecturer in the Department of Music at Providence College in Rhode Island where he teaches voice class, lyric diction, song repertoire, opera/musical theatre workshop, music in the theatre and music appreciation. At Trinity Repertory Theater in Providence, Rhode Island David was musical director for The Picnic and last Christmas season he served as the assistant music director for A Christmas Carol. He has also done national tours of To Whom It May Concern by Carol Hall and A Child's Christmas in Wales by Dylan Thomas. David was the musical Director of the 2002 production of Merrily We Roll Along at Providence College.

#### Christopher T. Kelton, D.M. - conductor, resident artist

Dr. Kelton is in his 10th year at Providence College, currently serving as an assistant professor of music. As a faculty member of the department of music, he conducts the concert band, wind ensemble, jazz band and chamber ensembles. He also teaches courses in jazz, woodwind methods, applied clarinet and saxophone. He holds a DM degree in woodwind performance and literature from Indiana University, an ME from Southwestern Oklahoma State and a BS from the University of Illinois. Dr. Kelton has performed with Diane Schuur, the Jimmy Dorsey Orchestra, the Lawrence Welk orchestra with Myron Floren, Rachael Lee, Steve Allen, Mel Torme, Doc Severinson, Shari Lewis, Rich Little, Dave Brubeck, Clark Terry, Dan Haerle, Pearl Bailey and Louis Bellson. He has performed as a soloist at World Saxophone Congresses in Japan, Italy, Spain and the U.S. His students have won Music Teachers National Association competitions at state and regional levels and National Association of Jazz Educators and Downbeat awards nationally.

This is Dr. Kelton's fourth musical show on campus; previously he directed bands or orchestras for the student production of *G.I. Jive*, and the Blackfriars Theatre productions of *Anything Goes* and *Merrily We Roll Along*.

#### Michael Micucci - scenic designer, visiting artist

Michael A. Micucci is pleased to be designing the first theatrical production at the new Blackfriars Theatre. He is the Director of Design and Production at the Walnut Hill School in Natick, MA where he teaches and designs scenery and lighting. Michael has designed over 20 productions at Walnut Hill including Beggars in the House of Plenty, Rhinoceros, The Who's Tommy, Ring 'Round the Moon, The Crucible, Blood Brothers, Hay Fever, and in May, The Pajama Game. He has also designed lighting for the Shakespeare Now! productions of Romeo and Juliet, Julius Caesar, and MacBeth. Michael has an MFA from the University of Arkansas where he designed scenery for Picasso at the Lapin Agile, Mother Hicks, and The Cripple of Inishmann. Michael lives in Westborough, MA with his wife Rebecca.

#### Eleanor Moore - lighting designer, visiting artist

Eleanor is excited to be working on her first production with Providence College. Her work has been seen primarily in the Boston area for companies such as The Lyric Stage Company, Boston Musica Viva, Theatre Boston, Ovature Productions, and Northeast Youth Ballet.
