SENIORS CHOOSE SUPERLATIVES

CHARLIE COTTAM RECEIVES
TWO DISTINCTIONS IN POLL

Charles F. Cottam of North Providence was voted the most likely to succeed and the one who had done the most for the school in the annual senior superlative poll conducted by the seniors yesterday. Cottam was the only one to receive a two-fold honor.

The title of "most popular" went to the smiling band leader from Hartford, William (Tiny) Quinn. Robert F. Reilly of Brooklyn, N.Y. was chosen as the best athlete. Bob was outstanding in baseball and basketball at the college.

Howard Kenney, editor of "Veritas", was believed by seniors to be the best socialite. The cup for sartorial excellence was awarded to Owen Sherry. Both Kenney and Sherry hail from Providence.

Frank X. Stadnicki of Central Falls, Pyramid Player luminary for the past three years, ran away with the "best actor" award. The title "handsomest" went to Leo F. Leary of Providence, a senior class officer.

William Flemming of Providence was voted the wittiest of the senior wits.

A tie resulted for the honor of the "best politician". Israel Moses of Providence and David Joyce of Providence were the ones selected to co-share this distinction.

HURLERS PACE FRIARS TO DOUBLE WIN

BROWN AND NEWPORT TRAINING
STATION BOW IN NINTH

Disproving the old adage that "pitchers don't hit" two Friar chuckers supplied the stickwork that gave Providence victories over Brown and the Newport Training Station nine.

On the otherwise quiet Fourth Ernie Brousseau exploded a single into centre field that scored the only tallies of the game as the Friars edged the Bruins 2-0.

This action occurred in the ninth frame and broke up a tight hurling duel between the chunky P.C. righthander and Earl Nichols of Brown. Ed Lee contributed a double and a single to the Friar cause.

The Quirkmen returned home Sunday to engage in another mound battle. Dick Mahoney, lanky Taunton righthander, was the hero this time as he limited the Newport Naval Training Station forces to seven hits and then topped off his performance by driving a long single to right centre in the last of the ninth to score Johnny Ferguson with the deciding marker in the 4-3 win.

Chet Massa, the Friar third sacker, really teed off on the Sailors' hurlers, gathering two doubles and a triple in five trips to the plate.

Then in the fifth the victors added seven more to swell their total to 14. The fifth inning was one for the record book, after Fr. 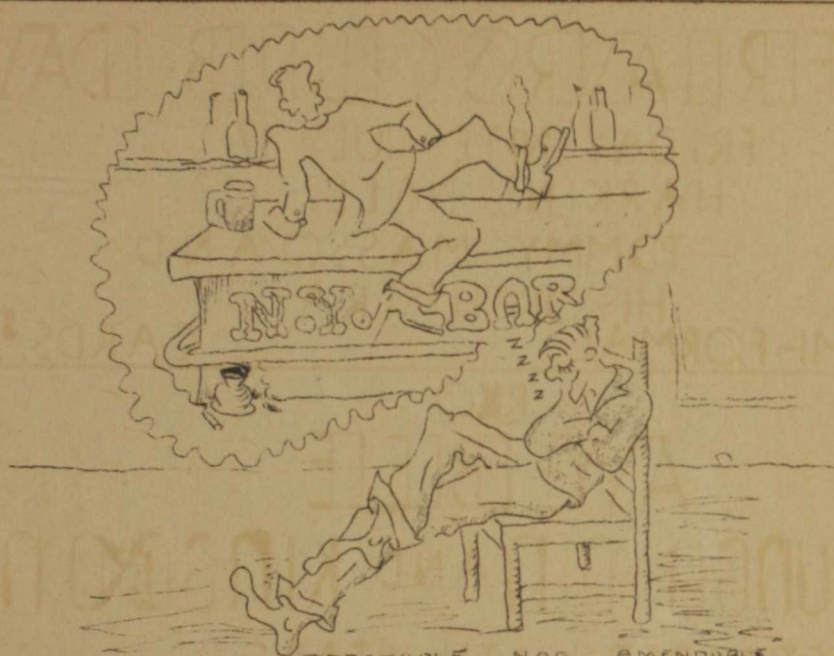
