Scoring five markers in the eighth to tie up the game and coming from behind again in the tenth to score three runs, the Triars nipped the heavy-hitting 10th Coast Artillery nine 10-9 last Sunday afternoon at Hendricken Field:




CROSSWORD PUZZLE

In a closely contested game the Faculty received its first setback since Guzman turned the trick two weeks ago. In the fourth frame the "Mad Monks" put the game on ice with a six run uprising.

The Faculty failed to display any of the real slugging of which a victory could have been realized. The usually brilliant fielding of the Faculty fell completely apart after the first two innings of play. It is at this point that I wish to inform the student body that I do not count errors so as not to be the tool of any act of destroying the sincere efforts of those playing.

Fr. Begley did a very capable job of twirling for the Faculty in the absence of Fr. Friel. He made three solid base blows which aided the losing cause greatly. The return of Fr. Quinn to the lineup is the one factor that stood out in the defeat. He made two hits, one of which was a lusty double and drove in two runs besides counting with one himself.

The slugging duo of Fr. Whittaker and Fr. O. Connell had a good time at the plate collecting five hits, three of which were well smacked triples. The entire Faculty lineup made hits to the tune of 17 as the Mad Monks, were collecting 16.

The heavy hitters of the winning team were, Barrett, Naples, Sica, Connolly, and Feldberg having 12 of the 16 base hits made for their cause. Mr. Parise pitched a very good game and appeared to be in trouble only once, the seventh when the Faculty staged a late Tally to score four runs.
