## FORMER P.C. CHAPLAIN RECEIVES NEW POSTS OF PRIOR \*PASTOR

Very Rev. John B. Reese, O.P., former chaplain and formerly professor of education and religion at the college, has been elected prior and appointed pastor of St. Vincent Ferrer's Church, New York Citym college authorities announced yesterday.

Fr. Reese was ordained June 15,1931, by Most Rev. Michael J. Curley, D.D., Archbishop of Baltimore and Washington.

After a year at Catholic University as student-priest, he was assigned to Providence College in September, 1932, where he remained until 1939. In that year he became secretary to the Very Rev. Stephen T.Mc Dermott, O.P., provincial, a post he held up to the present. Fr.Reese is the first Dominican alumnus of the college to be elected a oprior. a second Samuel Pepys.

This is but another way of saying that John keeps a diary. And a rather remarkable diary it is too. The first entry dates back to January 1st, 1926, and not a day has passed since then that John has not filed an entry in his trusty little diary. John P. says that his usual proceedure is to fill one-year diaries, but since a library of sixteen volumes would be too clumsy, he has twice resorted to five-year books, so that ten of the sixteen years between '26 and '42 are recorded in two massive tomes.

In this period of time, John has seen four presidential elections come and go, but, as he wryly

observes, only two presidents. In the belief that the diary can speak better for itself, we print below several entreies which John has graciously provided us with.

Sunday, May 17: " Vacation; Got up at 9:30, shaved and had breakfast by 10:00. Went to 10:30 Mass. Peg and I took a long ride after dinner. Played tennis in the afternoon with Peg. In the evening took Peg to the movies to see 'Ride 'Im Cowboy' at the Palace. Caught by the Army-Navy Relief collection for the second time in a week; twenty cents - ten for each of us. Had a good time after the show. Peg and I came home at 11:45. Went to bed at 12:30."

Wednesday, May 27:

' Vacation; Got up at 9:00. Had breakfast at 9:15. Worked cutting the lawn from 9:30 to 1:30. I finished Auntie's lawn completely. Cut down her maple tree. Peg and

I went up to the lake with J.C. Reardon. We all took Reardon's boat for a run on the lake. were all very tired upon returning to Lawrence from the lake. Peg and I went to see a show -'This Life Is our's'. We returned home at 11:00. I went to bed at 11:45."

Here we include the entry that has become famous. It is destined to take its place beside Holy Thursday and Good Friday!

DIRTY Monday, July 20: "Got up at 6:30; had broakfast at 7:15. Received no mail from home today. Got notice from Shepard's Reflex Studio regarding my graduation pictures. poorly in my classes today. Received a low mark Of -- from Doc O'Neill for the month. downtown in the afternoon to see ----. Spent twenty five cents for ink, paper, and shaving oream. After supper, went to see the movie, 'Big Shot' at the Majestic. Felt better after seeing Humbhrey Bogart, despite my poor day. Went to bed at 11:30."

Thursday, July 23: worked on Law Cases from 4:00 in the morning to 6:50. Had breakfast at 7:15. Received a letter from Peg with a note enclosed from Mother. Had a fairly good day in class. Finished reading 'The Moon Is Down' by Steinbeck in the afternoon. up the story of the softball game between the Faculty and the Science boys for the Friar Mercury. Paid three cents for a late return of library book. Worked on Law and Theodicy. Went to bed at 11:20."

In conclusion, John says that his diary is not kept under lock and key. His life is an open book ....
