A Recap of the Student Congress Presidential Debate

The race for President of the 1992-The race for President of the 1992-93 Student Congress is sharply di-vided between two vasity different candidates. Their campaigns seem to run along traditionally opposed party lines; one acting as a Republi-can, working for the Administration and making changes from the inside; the other acting as a Democrat by attempting to reach out to the needs. attempting to reach out to the needs of the students. These views came head-to-head in the Presidential debate held Tuesday evening in '64

Hall. The first candidate, junior Mark Ruggeri, iscurrently serving as presi-dent of Student Congress. Appear-ing polished in delivering his open-ing statement, Ruggeri described his

job as president: "One day I'm advis-ing a student who was arrested off-campus; the next day, I'm consulting the Administration about a proposal; and the next day I'm discussing pertinent topics with other members of Congress." Mark cited bin

of Congress." Mark cited his experience as an asset: "One cannot just step into this office and take over." He stressed that he does not rest

on past achievements, but has con-structed a clear-cut vision for the future.

The second candidate, junior Craig The second candidate, junior Craig Frick, has served on Congress as class representative and he currently serves as class treasurer. Appearing friendly and comfortable, Frick opened up by stressing the need for new leadership. He believes that communication skills are vital: "The

Rugger proposed the idea of hosting a neighborhood block party, where neighbors of the com-munity and students can interactin a friendly atmosphere. "This effort on the part of the student body will serve as a starting block for improv-ing relations by allowing both par-ties to overcome the fear of approach-ing each other."

He also cited controlling spend-ing in the budget and the need for diversifying Congress. Frick pointed out his main goals staking steps to improve safety off-campus as well as working on im-proving off-campus relations. He also cited a tighter monitoring of the Treasury.

Ruggeri pointed out his past efforts in office, saying that "what is important is not something suc-ceeded but something tried." Overall, Ruggeri spoke from an informed, technical point of view of someone who has been there, while Frick anneared optimistic and on
