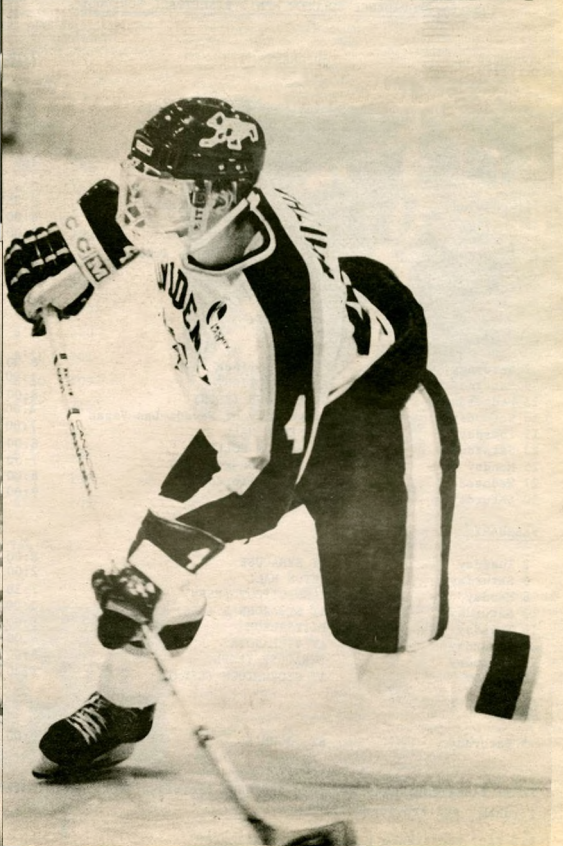

What's in State After the Final Four

What a year! Providence College entered the 1986-87 season with hopes of improving on their NIT performance from the year before. With Rick Pitino at the helm, a group of overachievers meshed as the season went along. Last year's Friars squad then rode a wave of emotion all the way to New Orleans and The Final Four. But what will the 1987-88 edition of the P.C. basketball team bring? This could be a mystery.

Rick Pitino brought Providence basketball from its lowest depth to a stunning performance in the NCAA tournament. But he took his act to the New York Knicks and the NBA.

Billy "the kid" Donovan became the darling of the basketball world last year. His dribbling, passing, and shooting ability brought him from the bench under Joe Mullaney to the third round pick of the Utah Jazz.

Dave Kipfer, the "Blue-Collar Friar" has graduated. Ernie "Pop" Lewis leaves the memory of the biggest win at the Civic Center in years - his three pointer at the buzzer beat Georgetown. Jack Duda went from benchwarmer to starter. But he too has graduated.

In fact the Friars graduated four of five starters from last year's miracle makers. So the question remains, what can Providence fans expect for the post-Pitino era?

For starters, expect the same style of play from this year's team: full-court pressure, fast break basketball, and three point shooting - all under the guidance of new head coach Gordon Chiesa. But as all Friar fans know, Chiesa is no stranger to the PC hoop system. As head assistant for the last two years, Chiesa will stay with the system that brought Providence to The Final Four last season. But it is safe to say that Chiesa will be working with a better group of athletes this year; he will adjust the style of play based on his players' abilities. The task at hand then is mold the players individual talents into a successful team.

The only returning starter from last year is co-captain DeRay Brooks. Brooks averaged 14.4 points a game last year, his first at P.C. after his well chronicled transfer from Hoosier Land. Without a doubt, Brooks is the biggest outside shooting threat in the entire Big East (66-157) from 3 point land. Will he, however, be as successful this year without the presence of former backcourt mate Billy Donovan.

Carlton "Paco" Screen will be the key to that question. For the Friars to be competitive, Screen must take charge of the offense from his point guard slot. His excellent court vision and ability to take it to the hole will relieve some of the pressure on Brooks.

The other co-captain of the Friar contingent is senior center Steve Wright. Wright must display the tenacity on defense and aggressiveness on the boards that he did in the Southeast Regional. P.C. fans who witnessed Wright's dominance of NBA draftee Derrick McKey of Alabama, and seven mammoth blocks against Georgetown, know that P.C. will go as far as Wright does this year. Steve was not the only Wright in the S.E. Regional.

Forward Darryl Wright made the All-Tourney team down in Louisville thanks to an incredible 11-12 shooting spree in the two game span, including four consecutive 3 pointers against the Hoyas. While Chiesa can not expect D. Wright to duplicate such an unbelievable performance, he will need a strong effort for him (and Steve) everytime he enters the game.

Rebounding was an area of concern for the Friars every game last year despite the Final Four season.

Dave Kipfer was the leading rebounder during the 1986-87 season with a not-so-gaudy 5.3 RPG. Two tourney mature sophomores could help in that department, Marty Conlon and Abdul Shamsid-Deen.

Conlon has added some bulk to his 6-10 frame. The added strength should help him not only in the rebounding department, but also in respect to his tough offensive game.

Abdul Shamsid-Deen is the other 6-10 sophomore who will see a lot of playing time this year. He will contribute heavily on the defensive end of the court, where he was the teams no. 2 shot blocker last season. Rebounding should also become a bigger part of Shamsid-Deen's game as he begins this season stronger than last.

Another newcomer to the squad will definitely add some muscle on the boards. Cal Foster, a transfer from Vincennes JC in Ohio, will contribute immediately to the program; he enters Providence with two years of college ball under his belt. During the 1985-86 season, Foster helped his team to the finals of the junior college national tournament as their no. 4 scorer. Last season he was his teams 2nd

leading scorer and rebounder. While Foster should make an immediate impact with his rebounding prowess, Quinton Burton, who sat the 1986-87 season due to Prop. 48, will be needed to pick up some of the scoring slack created by the graduation of Lewis. His credentials are excellent, but his ability to adjust to life in the Big East could be a key to determining the Friars win-loss record for the year.

Although the three pointer was instituted just last year in the Big East, it seems as if it has been a weapon in the PC arsenal for years. So who will continue in the "tradition" of 3 pointers for the home team? How about Matt Palazzi. Palazzi sat out last year voluntarily, but is ready to make a quick impact as a shooting guard. As an outside shooting threat, he should enable Providence to remain at the top of the three point list in the country.

Depending on his back condition, Dave Snedeker could add depth to the forward line. Snedeker missed a majority of last season due to injury but could see quality

Chiesa: "I'm Ready"

"It's Friar time. Get out of bed. Start your game."

These words were spoken by Providence College's new men's basketball coach to Delray Brooks on August 21, 1987, the day he was hired.

"I called Delray at 7:00 a.m.," Gordon Chiesa said from behind a large wooden desk scattered with binders and notebooks.

"I wanted to get started right away."

Chiesa left the head coaching job at Manhattan College three years ago to become Rick Pitino's associate coach at PC. His rise to the top of the Friar basketball ladder is accompanied by increased pressure and greater public scrutiny.

"I'm ready for the task," Chiesa claims.

In an office filled with files and drawers jammed with player portfolios, scouting reports and playbooks Chiesa snatches up one binder and says "This is my bible."

The "bible" contains plans for practice and recruiting as well as says Chiesa finds inspirational. One section outlines how a Chiesa evaluates his teams. He enumerates the three points of this section emphatically.

Number one: How mature are the most talented players?

Number two: How much overall athletic talent do we have compared to the other teams?

Number three: The system—how good is it?

"We'll be very successful,"

Chiesa says of his 87-88 Friars, "because our system is the best."

The system Chiesa has installed revolves around those wearing the black and gold of PC.

"The only thing that matters is the players. People don't come to see you (the head coach). They come to see them."

The relationship Chiesa has with his squad is one of constant interaction. "I saw the Providence team more than Rick (Pitino) the past two years. I know them better than anyone."

Knowledge of a players' ability to drive to the basket or play defense is not Chiesa's first concern. "Until you know somebody's family and their background you don't know them." Only after learning who his players are is he able to teach them, claims Chiesa. "They don't care until I know them."

Although an unfamiliar figure to the average, Chiesa is a well-known member of the community of basketball coaches. He possesses one folder which contains dozens of letters signed by coaches from all over the country, congratulating him for being named PC's head coach.

Becoming a household name is not one of the reasons Chiesa accepted his new position at PC. "I've been doing this all my life without the name. I could care less about recognition."

The 37 year old Chiesa is not unfamiliar with running a college basketball program.

For five seasons he was basketball coach and athletic director of

St. Thomas Aquinas after spending two years at Dartmouth as an assistant. He compiled a 93-68 record at St. Thomas Aquinas, including three straight 20 win seasons.

In 1981 he took over the reigns at Manhattan College. He was named the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Coach of the Year in 1982-83 after leading Manhattan to its first winning season in eight years.

On a Friday morning at 10:00 a.m., Chiesa looks exhausted. His eyes are bloodshot and there are dark circles under them. "I'm here every day all year by 7:30. Last night I didn't leave until 1:00." A normal day for Chiesa.

Despite his fatigued appearance, Chiesa energetically springs about his office, pulling out files on opponents and his own team. "This is like a business for us," he says. "But instead of punching a computer, we're trying to beat Georgetown."

Even with all the hours Chiesa puts in at PC, he is able to spend time with his wife, Nancy, and their son, Matthew Alexander. "At home I'm family all the way. I never, never, never make a recruiting call in my home. Even if I was on my way home I'd stop and make a recruiting call from a pay phone."

After last season's remarkable trip to the NCAA Final Four, Chiesa is not about to allow his players to be content with the past.

"It's time to move on. We're going to add one more chapter to the tradition of Providence basketball."

Who Will Be the Beast in the Big East?

With the memories lingering from the excitement of last year's college basketball season many Big East teams are looking forward to getting a piece of the action this year. Some teams will look to repeat, others to improve and still others will just try to avoid disappointment.

The Boston College Eagles played everyone tough last season and proved to be a question mark when involved in a Big East contest. The Eagles will again depend on Dana Barros to lead the team on offense and will depend on Skip Barry and Tyrone Scott to grab rebounds. Unfortunately the Eagles will have to depend upon five young recruits to add much needed depth to this year's team. However they add much more talent than last year's Eagle team and therefore they should improve their 11-8 record of a year ago.

The Connecticut Huskies were victims of second semester ineligibility of Cliff Robinson and Phil Gamble. This duo combined to score more than half of the Huskies offense before they were forced to sit out the remainder of the season. With this tandem back

in the lineup the Huskies could challenge some of the Big East teams. UConn will look to Robinson to lead the team this year in the 6-9 pounder (18 ppg) will vent his frustration upon the rest of the Big East. With five new recruits added to the roster the Huskies will definitely be competitive this year however this program is still several years away.

The Georgetown Hoyas will look to Perry McDonald and Ronnie Highsmith to be the team leaders this year as the Hoyas are "Reggie-less". Also Mark Tillman and Dwayne Bryant, the sophomore guards will have to generate the offense that could be missing this year. For the Hoyas, who were a question mark last year to many preseason pollsters, this season will again be a question mark. But knowing Georgetown they will be on top as usual.

In Pittsburgh, the Panthers could be the beast of the East. With Charles Smith and Jerome Lane back you have 40 percent of last year's offense and 54 percent of its rebounding. Pitt also had three 1,000 point scorers on the court last year in Alken, Smith and Gore, and could repeat that with Smith, Gore and Lane. Add to this the top

recruiting class in the country and we have a serious contender. Pitt will make amends for last year's post season loss to Oklahoma in the NCAA's.

Emphasis On Speed

When Mike McShane became Head Coach of the men's hockey team three years ago, he began to emphasize the importance of team speed. After struggling last year (7-23-3) and bringing in his own recruits, McShane is realizing his goal.

"We've improved our overall team speed," McShane said. "We want strong skaters and forecheckers to make other teams turn the puck over."

The Friars top two scoring lines should benefit greatly by the added aggression of a second forechecker. Rick Bennett (15-12-27) will center the first line and will be flanked by right winger Tom Fitzgerald and left winger Dave Guden, Senior co-captain Craickshank (8) and Andy Mattice (c) are both proven scorers on the second line. They will be joined by freshman winger Pat Madigan.

"Mattice was really good last year," Craickshank said. "I expect him to pick up right where he left off. Madigan, on the rightside, looks like he's been here a few years. He knows how to put the puck in the net."

Craickshank speaks from experience.

The senior sniper terrorized opposing goalies last season scoring 27 goals while amassing 45 points.

Another outstanding season will put Craickshank over the 100 goal mark during his four years.

Presently the native of Mississauga, Ontario has played in 109 games with 70 goals and 114 points scored.

Freshman Mario Aube centers the third line.

Aube will look to set up another freshman, Paul Flaherty, on the left or Todd Whittemore at right wing. John Ferguson (c), John Butterworth (fw), and Luke Vitale (fw), all juniors comprise an experienced fourth line.

Shawn Whitham brings stability to an improved defense. Whitham, also a co-captain, had nine goals over a year ago and will team with Jeff Srowick for the first line defense.

"We have a lot more talented players," Whitham said. "Last year we played a lot of zone and laid back. This year we have a better team."

Junior Jim Hughes will be joined on defense by freshman Larry Rooney. Sophomores Joe DiGiacomo and Paul Saundercock will also see time.

Matt Merten is back in goal while Mark Romaine is top back up.

Merten and 4.29 goals against average had last season with a .871 save percentage. Paul Graf, a freshman, is the team's third goalie.

The outlook for the Friars is clouded. The team had only seven wins while breaking in 11 freshman last winter.

However, if any of the freshmen make an immediate impact and with the added experience of the returnees, Providence could move

up in the Hockey East standings.

If freshmen like Madigan, Aube, and Rooney make an immediate impact the Friars could be even better. The team has definitely improved, but presently no one knows how much.

"The coaches poll picked us to finish sixth out of seven," Craickshank said. "I don't see anyway we're going to finish that bad."

Tim Army has come home. Army, the captain of the 1985 Providence hockey team which finished runner-up to RPI in the Division I hockey finals, recently gave up on his professional hockey career and has returned to Providence as assistant.

"I found out the third or fourth week of August," said an enthusiastic Army who joins Scott Borek as assistant to head coach Mike McShane. "I have the desire to get into coaching and this is a great experience working under an experienced coach like Mike in the school I graduated from."

Army's responsibilities on the team will include recruiting and academic supervision. He will also supervise practice either on the ice or in the weight room.

Last season Army, a center, played in Finland for the majority of the year before moving to Switzerland.

Upon graduation from Providence he played a year in the American Hockey League, but moved on to Europe because of the

NCAA Expands Hockey Tourney

Following the bigger is better trend established by the NCAA Basketball Tournament Committee, the NCAA Executive Committee for Division I hockey has increased the size of the field for its post season tournament from eight to twelve teams.

One of the twelve spots in the tourney will be reserved for a team not belonging to one of the four big leagues: Hockey East, the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference (ECAC), the Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CHA) or the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA).

The remaining berth will go to an independent who fares well while playing a tough Division I

schedule. By deciding to expand, the committee is hoping to attract more teams to play Division I hockey. The move is also expected to increase the prestige of the tournament.

Under the present system the league champions of the four major leagues would receive an automatic berth and there would be eight at-large bids. The four highest rated teams will receive a first round bye while the other eight teams will be paired off at the sites of the higher ranked club. The winners of the first round, which will be played March 19-20, will then be re-seeded and will meet the teams which received a bye March 25-26. The four finalists will go to Lake Placid for the Semifinals and finals on March 31- April 2.

Dennis Hanks, the Director of Communications for the league since 1984, replaces former Providence Athletic Director Lou Lamoriello as Executive Director of the league. David Quinn, Boston University's All-American Candidate defenseman, will never play again due to Christmas disease, a rare blood-clotting disorder.

The Denver Pioneers are prohibitive favorites to win the Western Collegiate Hockey Association title. Minnesota, Wisconsin and North Dakota will also contend for a post season playoff opening.

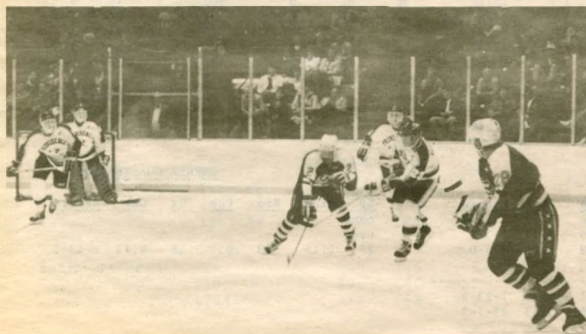

The 3-goal comeback was an auspicious start for what could be a potent Friar offense.

"It helps a lot," Cruickshank said. "It shows we can come back. It's a good thing to happen early in the season."

"We have a strong offensive team in terms of goals, but if you have offense you also need defense. We only lost four players so it's basically the same team. The new guys aren't treated like freshmen. They had the game against Concordia to be nervous and that's expected but now they are expected to produce."

The team is working the hardest it has in four years according to co-captains Cruickshank and Whitham. Three times a week the team is up at 6:00 a.m. working on weight lifting, conditioning and the power play and penalty killing units. The new fitness program is emphasizing bulk and stressing quickness according to Whitham.

Lady Friars Hope to Follow in Men's Footsteps

If you thought that P.C. basketball was remarkable last season, wait and see what the teams have in store for this year.

Both the men's and women's teams are coming off banner '86-'87 seasons with both teams participating in post-season play. Needless to say, all P.C. basketball fans would like to see a repeat performance of the dream trip that the men made to the Final Four in '87. This year, however, the Lady Friars would like to try for themselves that same long road. A Final Four appearance was predicted to be out of reach for the Friars but became a real journey that will not soon be forgotten in P.C. basketball history.

The Lady Friars would like to see themselves in '87-'88 taking the same route as the men and as last year's achievements indicated, such a journey may not be as unrealizable as most would tend to believe.

Last season the Lady Friars finished with a record of 23-9, the second straight year PC has recorded a 20 plus win season under third year head coach Bob Foley. In 1987 the Lady Friars also participated for the first time ever in the Women's National Invitational Tournament (WNIT) held in Amarillo, Texas. PC entered the tournament as the No. 2 seed, and after a 95-93 win over DePaul in the first round, the Lady Friars lost 89-79 to eventual WNIT champions, Arkansas, in the semifinals. The Lady Friars finished fourth in the tournament when they were defeated 91-89 by Creighton.

In the Big East, PC closed out its season 12-4 and in second place

in the five-year history of PC Women's basketball competition in the Big East, this was the Lady Friars third best finish. The four Lady Friar conference came at the hands of Syracuse, Villanova, and twice against St. John's. Prior to the Syracuse loss, the Lady Friars had upset conference leader Villanova 67-65, in Providence.

In the Big East tournament PC defeated Georgetown in the opening round 71-56. In the semi-finals the Lady Friars faced Boston College, a team they had beaten twice during the regular season, but came up one point short, losing 64-63.

If last season is any indication of what is to come for the Lady Friars, we all can expect big things from this year's team.

The Lady Friars will be courting success again in 1987-88 with their pressing running game. Coach Jesse returns seven letterwinners and welcomes six newcomers. The Lady Friars lost tri-captains Mary Burke, Doris Sable and Sheila Harrily, whose presence on the court will be missed, but Foley is confident in the abilities of his present team. The Lady Friars will be looking to returning players Diann Reynolds, Doreen Ferguson, Tina Covello, Andrea Mangum, Helen Jessie, Liz Lawlor, and Dottie VanGheen to provide leadership for the newcomers and to pick up the scoring slack due to the loss of Burke and Sable.

Coach Foley has great expectations for this year's team. "I really expect us to win the Big East. We will probably be ranked fourth or fifth at the beginning of the season, but nobody realizes how talented we are. Even I didn't realize how talented we were until our first practice. Our returning players

came back stronger, in better shape and hungrier. That's the most important thing, they are determined to win. Our new players are very talented and with good leadership by the seniors, they will also learn the work ethic that is needed to win in the Big East."

The confidence that coach Foley has placed in his team is far from unjustified. The team has come ready to face the rigorous schedule which they encounter as well as this year's new 6:00a.m. practice time. The entire program is optimistic about this new schedule, and Coach Foley is confident that this will benefit the team "mentally, physically, socially and academically."

At the start of the season the Lady Friars will face a difficult schedule. "We will play a very tough schedule this year. Besides playing a strong Big East schedule, we open with one of the best women's basketball teams in the world, the Canadian National team. Then we play 4th ranked Auburn in the Lady Sunshine Classic in Orlando, Florida. After that we host the Lady Friar Coca-Cola Classic with Maine, Duke and U.S.C. visiting. In the first month of the season we will play 4 teams who are ranked in the top 20 nationally. The strength of our early schedule should help us when it comes time to play our Big East schedule."

As for what Foley expects of the team in conference play, it can only be said that he wants nothing less than to go all the way and finish first, no matter what the pre-season rankings may predict. "I believe that the Big East is the most balanced conference in the country. I know this is a cliché, but on any given night any of the teams can

beat any of the other teams. Besides being balanced, I think that the Big East is a much better conference than many people are giving it credit for. I think we will shock the country when tournament time comes around."

Tri-captains of the '87-'88 Lady Friars Doreen Ferguson, Diann Reynolds and Tina Covello are looking to make their senior year an unforgettable one for everyone involved. Coach Foley has great expectations of his captains and will be placing large demands on their experience and skill throughout the season. "Nobody has worked harder than the seniors. They came back this year with something to prove. They were very upset with something to prove. They were very upset with the way the season ended last year and are determined to win the Big East title and go on to the NCAA's. I hope that the determination and work ethic of the seniors rub off on the six new members of our team. The new players are very talented but they must learn the work ethic that the seniors possess, and I expect that the seniors will inspire the underclassmen."

Diann Reynolds is one of the Lady Friars top returning players this season. The third leading scorer on the team last year (10.2ppg), Diann will be looked to to score the points and provide leadership at the guard position, replacing Doris Sable. Foley sees Reynolds as the key to creating more of an offense for the team. "Diann has worked very hard this summer to improve her game by learning to move without the ball. Now she not only shoots it well, she also creates shots that just weren't there last year. Diann has always been the hardest worker on the team, every year she comes back with something new."

Another strong link in the PC chain will be Doreen Ferguson, who is expected to contribute when more than her 8.6ppg and 5.4 rpg in the coming season. Foley expects Ferguson to play close to 25 to 30

minutes per game. "Doreen is the strongest girl on the team. She moves as well as on her outside shooting. I expect her to contribute on the boards and in the scoring. She will be a double threat because she can score from inside the paint as well as from 3-point land."

Tina Covello, leader of PC's special team last year, is a great role player and will do anything PC needs her to do to win. "Tina has made great strides in her game. Over the summer she worked hard to improve her jumpshot. Because of her hard work, I expect that her playing time will increase."

As for the remaining returning players, great things are expected by Foley of each of them.

As a freshman last year, forward Andrea Mangum had a great year for the Lady Friars and is expected to contribute even more this season. "Andrea came back this year much stronger so she should be an even more dominant force in the middle than she was last year. Playing in the Olympic Festival this summer was the best thing that could have happened to both Andrea and our team. She has brought back experience that will make her a better player and our team will benefit as a result."

Also expected to cause an impact this season are Helen Jessie, Liz Lawlor, and Dottie Van Gheen. Jessie is expected to contribute with her speed and her outside shot. "I expect her to contribute by adding a three point threat to our offense," said Foley. Lawlor will be needed inside for her strength and outside shooting. "Liz has been improving steadily since she has been on the team. I expect her to contribute with her inside scoring and aggressive rebounding." And finally, "Dottie came back much stronger and in better shape than she was last year. We will need strong play from her inside, especially on the boards."

Although the Lady Friars lost two of last year's top scorers add-

THE COACHES

Back for his third season as head coach of the Lady Friars, Bob Foley is looking to take the Big East by storm once again. Since his appointment as head coach in 1985, the Lady Friars have turned into one of the greatest threats in the Big East.

In his previous two seasons, Bob Foley has compiled a record of 46-131 (780), the second best winning percentage since women's varsity competition began in 1974.

Under the eye of Foley, the Lady Friars have come a long way. In the 1985-1986 season PC received its first ever Top 20 ranking and a first ever bid to the NCAA Tournament. The team lost a heartbreaker to James Madison 55-53 in the opening round in Providence.

Foley was named Big East Con-

ference Coach of the Year, New England District I Coach of the year by the Women's Sports Foundation. Recently, he was named Coach of the Year by Rhode Island Words Unlimited, a state-based organization of sports writers and sports information directors.

Success is not a new thing to Foley and he intends to keep up his winning ways. A 1974 graduate of Villanova University, he has coached for several years on the high school level before he entered the collegiate circle. Seven of eight teams Foley has been associated with have been ranked in the Top 20 nationally, three in the Top 10.

Assisting Foley with the Lady Friars will be third year coaching partner Cathy Parson (West Virginia-1984) and newcomer Felicia Cavallini (Rice University-1984).

ed to this year's team will be six newcomers, 5 freshmen and 1 junior transfer, who undoubtedly will make an impact on the team.

Shanya Evans, a 5-2 guard from Baltimore, MD was a two time USA Today Honorable Mention All-American and Baltimore Sun Player of the Year. She averaged 12.6 ppg, 4.2 rpg, 6.5 apg, and 3.5 spg her senior year. Last year's Naismith player of the year in Maryland, she was nominated for the Olympic trials, named to the All-America Team by the National High School Coaches' Association, voted MVP of the Metro Classic tournament as well as being selected to the All-Metro First Team. At Wallerack High, she was Athlete of the year as a senior. She won the Jiffy Lube Player of the Year Scholarship and was chosen a Converse All-Star. Coach Foley comments that "Shanya is a 5-2 dynamo who will get a lot of playing time. I expect her to come in and contribute immensely, especially in pushing the ball up the floor. We'll depend on her passing as well as her ballhandling skills."

Stacy Brown, a 5-10 junior forward comes to PC via the College of the Sequoias in Visalia, California. Brown was last year's MVP at the California Junior College State Championship, averaging 14.9 ppg, 7.5 rpg as a second year player and was named MVP of the Sequoias and DeAnza Invitationals last year. She was a two year starter for the Giants and finished NO. 1 in all time scoring (772 pts.) and No. 2 in rebounds (469). Also an outstanding track athlete, she took 3 first place finishes-100m hurdles, 400m relay and high jumping her team to an overall third place finish at the Northern California Track Regionals. Brown was a four year starter at George Washington High, where she

averaged 20 ppg and 13 rpg as a senior. She was voted captain of her basketball team her senior year and was selected Second Team Indiana All-Star. Coach Foley comments that "She has great athletic ability and great jumping ability. I expect her to help us on the boards and pick up some of the scoring load."

Nancy Ford, a 5-10 forward from Lindenhurst, Long Island was a 3 year starter an Lindenhurst averaging 12 ppg, 8 rpg and 4.4 spg. She was a member of the All Long Island Team her senior year and is a great athlete. Coach Foley says "Nancy has the ability to play two different spots for us. She will be a wing player for us, either the 2 spot or 3 spot and is an intelligent player who will easily pick up our system."

Monica Womack, a 6-0 center from District Heights, MD was an All-League Second Team in Prince Georges County. Womack is entering PC on a Martin Luther King academic scholarship, she averaged 17.6 ppg and 12 rpg as a senior. Foley believes "She is an excellent athlete who runs the floor well and will fit into our running and pressing style."

Alex of Brooklyn, N.Y. PG gains Aletha Osbourne a 6-0 center. Osbourne averaged 22 ppg and 17 rpg her senior year. She was a 1st Team CHSAA (All-Catholic) League and First Team All-Tablet. She was MVP of the Seniors Exceptional Game for New York City and was an Honors student at her high school. Also, Osbourne was a Medal Winner in track and volleyball and co-captain her basketball team as a senior. Foley says "She is an extremely intelligent player. We feel she will be the ability to contribute right away."

The final recruit is 5-7 guard Stephanie Cole. Cole was a USA Today Honorable Mention All-

America, was voted the NO. 1 player in the AUSA Conference her senior year, averaged 16.5 ppg, 7.8 rpg and 3.3 spg. She was named MVP and selected First Team AUSA All-Star, tri-captained her team in her senior year, received the Best Offensive Player of the Year Award, Outstanding Contribution to Basketball Award, and was voted Female Athlete of the Year her senior year. Cole is also an honor student and was a member of the AAV Junior Olympic Team with Andrea Mangum, Foley on Steph. "She can score, she passes the ball very unselfishly and she's a hard worker. I expect her to make a great contribution."

With such incoming talent it seems inevitable that the Lady Friars are going to go far. This years roster is a larger one than in previous years and the added depth should make a marked improvement on PC's last style of play.

Winning will be nothing new for the Lady Friars, and with the determination demonstrated by the team and the coaches success will come as no surprise.

With the coaching efforts of Coach Foley combined with those of assistants Cathy Parson and newcomer Felicia Cavallini, the Lady Friars are well on their way to what should prove to be a spectacular season.

The Lady Friars season begins on Wednesday Nov. 11 with an exhibition game against one of the top women's basketball teams in the world, the Canadian National Team, 6:00 pm at Alumni Hall. From there PC goes on to what looks to be a successful season. Coach Foley has high hopes for this years team, and with any luck and a lot of practice, PC basketball fans could be following the Lady Friars down that same road the men took one year ago.

Ladies Hope to Set More Records

The Lady Friars have spent the past two seasons under head coach Bob Foley breaking and setting all sorts of records.

When the dust settled from the 1986-87 Big East Tournament, the Lady Friars had established some new conference records. As a freshman, Andrea Mangum established a conference freshman record with 8.8 rebounds per game. PC registered the most rebounds during the Big East season with 663 and the best rebound average (41.0) in 16 games.

PC received honorable mention Top 20 votes during the 1986-87 season and consistently ranked in the weekly national team and individual polls published by the NCAA. On the national front, the

Lady Friars finished the season NO. 4 in scoring (84.8 ppg), NO. 16 in field goal percentage (49.6), and NO. 10 in free-throw percentage (73.6).

Providence College was the only school in the nation to have both men's and women's basketball teams listed in the top five in the nation in scoring (week of 2-16-87). The Lady Friars ranked fourth averaging 85.0 ppg and the men were fifth, scoring 87.7 ppg.

The Lady Friars once again during the 1986-87 season were the undisputed No. 1 women's collegiate basketball team in New England. The Lady Friars hold a lifetime record of 75-15 (.833) against 37 New England competitors, and even the past two years, PC's New England record is 20-1.

Lady Skaters Seek Offense

With the return of 12 letterwinners and the initiation of two rookies, head coach John Marchetti is quietly optimistic about the upcoming season. "Women's college ice hockey has become much more competitive in the last few years," said the coach. "Their league is getting tougher and there's more parity. Defensively, we're strong... but the test for us this year will be on offense."

While this year's schedule is similar to last year's, "this year will be tougher because all the teams have improved so much...the wins will be harder to come by." In addition to 16 regular season games, PC has three scheduled tournaments—The Can/Am International (Toronto, Canada), the

Princeton Invitational in early January and the new Hockey East Invitational in mid-January.

The Lady Friar defense will be anchored by sophomores Kelly O'Leary, Laurie Blair and Debbie Barnhill. Freshman Lisa Pacione will join the wall in front of freshman goalie Shannon Swezey. "The sophomores gained valuable playing experience last year," said Coach Marchetti, "and the newcomers have the potential to make us defensively."

PC's offense will revolve around centers Lisa Brown, Heather Linstad and Heather Laduke. "In our game, centers dominate," said Marchetti. Last year the PC centers scored 39 goals accounting for 40 percent of the team's total offense.

"With a lot of hard work and dedication, I'm confident our forwards—Marlene Ricci, Colleen McLellan, Joanne Leonard, Michelle Ricci, Ann Kennedy and Denise Lane—can get the job done." Last year, Linstad led the team in goals scored (23) and total points (38), while Brown finished second in both of those categories with 18 goals scored and 34 total points. Laduke finished No. 3 in total points, leading the team in assists with 17.

"In order to accomplish our goal, (winning a third ECAC title), we're going to have to produce more offensive firepower...there's no question the potential is there."

Meet Coach Marchetti, Lady Friar Leader

Entering his eighth year as head coach of the Providence College women's ice hockey team is John Marchetti, who has been affiliated with the college since his graduation in 1971.

Hired as the program's second head coach back in 1980, Marchetti's success speaks for itself: sporting the best PC women's ice hockey record—126 wins, 31 losses, 5 ties for a .803 winning percentage. Adding to the significance of those figures is the fact that he is the only head coach to win back-to-back ECAC titles (1983-84, 1984-85), a PC record as well as an ECAC women's ice hockey record. A full-time employee of the PC Athletic Department, John, who

serves as head coach of the Lady Friar softball team, also is a regular staff instructor at the Providence College Summer Hockey Camp for boys, a position he has enjoyed for the past 12 years. Following his team's 21-1, 1983-84 record and the team's first-ever ECAC crown, Marchetti was honored as Coach of the Year by *The Cowl*.

As a former teacher at nearby Johnston High School, the Wellesley, Massachusetts native coached the Johnston boys' ice hockey team to its first league title in 1977, including five additional trips to the state playoffs and a 81-50-8 career record. Marchetti resides in Plainville, Massachusetts.

When asked to recap the 1986-87 women's ice hockey season, head coach John Marchetti said, "It was a growing experience for most of the younger players...a really good learning experience. We played some good hockey."

That they did. While the Lady Friars were hauled in the semifinal round of the ECAC Championships, 2-1, by Northeastern, putting to rest any hopes of winning a third ECAC crown, Coach Marchetti's squad produced a fine 16-7-1 overall record and a third place finish in ECAC's regular season standings, including several stunning highlights.

Headlining the win list was PC's victory in the annual Providence

College Christmas Invitational in two years, defeating Colby, 11-0; RIT, 7-2; and Princeton, 3-0. Named to the All-Tournament Team were veteran goalie Kathy Carney, and forwards Lisa Brown and Heather Linstad. That was followed by a third place finish in the Granite State Invitational in Durham, New Hampshire.

Most outstanding on the year, however, was PC's tournament win at the 19th Annual Theresa Humes Invitational in Montreal, Canada, their fourth such victory. "That was our biggest triumph of the season," said Marchetti. "We were playing well at the time, and a lot of the younger players were getting some quality ice time." In the

finals against Northeastern, it was PC senior Lori Marotta who broke a 3-3 deadlock at 7:16 of the second overtime period to give the Lady Friars the win. Heather Laduke, Michelle Ricci and Heather Linstad each scored for PC, while senior goalie Sue Mussey and defenseman Yvonne Percy were named to the All-Tournament Team and Marotta, most appropriately, was named MVP.

PC's regular season bouts with New Hampshire and Northeastern, who finished one and two respectively in the conference, saw the Black and White turn in a 0-3-1 record against New Hampshire, the eventual 1986-87 ECAC champions, and a 2-3 record against the Northeastern Huskies.

Friars Are Optimistic

The Friars approach the 1988 indoor track season on an optimistic note, the small roster including some of the best talent ever seen at PC, names that can rank alongside the calibre of John Treacy, Geoff Smith and Andy Ronan. The team includes the pure speed of Bill Mulaney, Sean Keahane, Scott Jones, John Evans and Frank Conway, and this is coupled with the distance strength of John Allen, Keiron Tumbleton, Mark Keller, Eddie Hanratty, John Duggan and Mike Scanlon, to give the squad an all-round look.

The optimism on Coach Treacy's part comes from the fact that for the first time in over a year the team is injury free.

The 1987 squad was devastated by both injury and illness, with stars Duggan, Conway and Evans all having to miss the major part of the season.

But with all the problems behind them, the Friars are hopeful of having a top class season.

One of the major highlights is the return of Evans after a serious knee injury that meant a whole year of inactivity.

The Liverpool native had a spectacular freshman year which saw him win Big East and I.C.A.A. 800m titles, finish 8th in the N.C.A.A. Championship and break four school records. After missing the whole of his sophomore year to injury Evans is again hopeful of a good season.

The same can also be said of Frank Conway. After two convincing victories at the beginning of last year, Conway was struck by a serious illness which curtailed his fine improvement. His cross-country form shows that he is now ready to fulfill his outstanding potential.

Rhode Island native Duggan is also ready to impress in his first collegiate track season.

A high school star before coming to PC, Duggan is now ready to reward the faith many have shown in him.

In his sophomore teammate, Bill Mulaney, the Friars are blessed with one of the top junior (11:20) runners in the world.

His 3:44 1500m time of last year makes him one of the fastest seventeen year olds ever, and he will go into the outdoor season as one of

the world Junior Championships to be held in Canada, and he is also hopeful of making the Irish Olympic team.

Irish senior, Hanratty, Keller and Tumbleton again provide the backbone of the team.

Hanratty and Keller both took second places at last year's Big East Championships, and they will be looking to go one better this year. Hanratty was the 1986 New England mile champion.

Tumbleton is ready for his best track season ever, especially after an awesome cross-country season. Able to race over any distance between 800m and 5000m, Tumbleton will provide the all-round ability that the small team needs.

Juniors, Allen and Keahane, and sophomore Mike Scanlon, are names to watch on the track this year.

Allen has shown steady improvement over 2000m, and he should dictate his best time of 14:26.

Middle distance men, Scanlon and Keahane will challenge for top positions, both capable of breaking the 3:50 barrier for 1500m indoors.

Senior, Jones, rounds out the roster, the 800m specialist ready to improve his P.R. of 1:54 in his last collegiate year.

Women Gunning For Success

As the women's track team enters its tenth year of varsity competition, the upcoming 1987-88 season seems to be earmarked for success.

Top returnees Siobhan Gallagher, Tina Moloney, Christine Crowley, and Jacqui Stokes will be gearing up for a fine season along with newcomers Debbie Eccleston (a 100 and 200 meter specialist) and Anita Philpott (a cross-country and indoor and outdoor 1,500 meter runner). In her rookie season last year, Gallagher was the wunderkind in the PC stables. The Ballyshannon, Ireland native was the only trackster, man or woman, to qualify for all three national championships. She was one of six women out of 20 who competed in the 1,500 meters in the ECAC's to qualify for nationals and the first woman runner ever to qualify for nationals. Gallagher finished third in the BIG EAST Conference Cross-Country Championships, second at the New-Englands, and third at the ECAS. By the indoor season, everyone wanted to see what records she would shatter. She went on to set school records in the 800 meters (2:14.8) in the RITAC's at Brown and 1,500 meters record of 4:31.8

in the Boston College Open. She ran the eighth fastest 1,500 meter time in the country at the New-Englands (4:21.7) and set a school record in the one mile run at the Greater Boston Invitational with a second place time of 4:51.

The rookie runner continued to burn her own pace taking firsts in the 5,000 meters (17:30.92) at Yale and setting a school record in the 800 meters (2:08.0) at the Boston College Relays. At the BIG EAST Championships, Siobhan took second place in the 1,500 meters in a personal best/school record time of 4:21.66. At the ECAC's, again, she set a school record/personal best time of 4:19.93 taking second place in the 1,500 meters. Her lowest finish was a ninth place in the 3,000 meters (9:29.8) at the Penn Relays, that too, however, was a school record.

Were it not for the overall well-rounded skill and athletic ability of Coach Treacy's young team, the 1986-87 season could have been the Siobhan Gallagher show. Outstanding performances by a number of PC women runners throughout the year—Jacqui Stokes (long jump record holder 19' 5 1/2"); personal best time in the 5,000 meters (17:03.59)

for second in the BIG EAST outdoor meet by Christine Crowley; personal best time in the 1,500 meters (4:44) for Cheryl McGowan; personal best in the 10,000 meters BIG EAST outdoor meet (36:51.6) by Patricia Logan and a personal best in the triple jump for Helen Lastovica again at the BIG EAST meet—made it a year of ongoing accolades.

The Track Coaching Staff

HEAD COACH RAY TREACY

1982 graduate of Providence College and three-time All-American selection for the Friars, Ray Treacy enters his third full season as head cross-country and track coach of both the men's and women's teams at Providence.

Since coming on board as head coach, Treacy has kept the men's consecutive dual/tri meet cross-country winning streak going, presently at 19, while coaching the Lady Friars to their undefeated cross-country season for the second consecutive year. His first year as head coach, the women finished 8-0, last year the lady harriers finished 9-0. His acute knowledge of conditioning and training has expanded both running programs to national prominence, once again boasting a perfect 15-0 dual record for the men and a 17-0 record for the women of Olympian silver medalist John Treacy. Ray was a three-time All-American, a two-time New England Cross-Country champion, and a three-time 5,000 meter BIG EAST Indoor Champion during his four-year tenure at

PC. In addition, he was an IC4A Champion in the 10,000 and 5,000 meters in 1981 and 1982, respectively. A team captain his junior and senior years, Ray also was a two-time Academic All-American selection. The former Irish National junior cross-country champion and past member of the Irish National Cross-Country Team, Ray is a native of Villierstown, Ireland. He resides in Warwick with his wife, Lisa, and their son, Michael.

ASSISTANT COACH DICK HOPPMAN

Entering his second year as assistant men's and women's cross-country and track coach at PC is Dick Hoppman, a native of West Warwick, Rhode Island. Organizer and founder of the Providence Track Club, Hoppman's coaching debut took place at Cranston High West in 1981 where in two short years he re-established the boys' track team as one of the top schoolboy programs in the state.

Following his stint at West, Dick was appointed head coach at Our Lady of Providence Seminary, where once again he brought much success to yet another schoolboy program. He produced more Rhode Island all-stars there than any other Providence area school. At OLP, Dick's teams always ranked as one of the top finishers in its division. Two schoolboy prodigies under Hoppman's guidance were Northeast Region Honorable Mention High School All-American, Jessie McAlmon and schoolboy triple jump All-New England selection, Mike Leddy.

Dick is a biology and human development teacher at East Providence High. He received his undergraduate degree from Rhode Island College in 1969, his MAT in biology in 1971, and later his master's degree in developmental psychology in 1975 from Rhode Island College. Dick and his wife, Simone, have three children, Jennifer 17, Lori 14, and Richard 12. They reside in West Warwick.

SWIMMING 87-88

An excellent recruiting effort by aquatic director and head coach John O'Neill and a strong cast of returning veterans give the 1987-88 men's and women's swimming and diving program everything it needs for a successful year. In his fourth season at the helm of the Big East team, Coach O'Neill is looking for a consistent showing from his athletes to provide upset victories against well established teams such as the University of Connecticut and St. John's University.

The scoring methods of NCAA dual meets (swimming and diving) are designed to reward teams with greater depth. To answer this challenge O'Neill says, "We've got more depth than ever before".

Butterfly sprinter Paul Soligan, who trained and competed this summer in his hometown, Huntington, Ct., and freshman Gaylord Garraway (distance freestyle/butterfly) are expected to provide depth in the upcoming season.

The women's team also exhibits great depth in the varied talents of Cindi Luciani, who also trained and competed this summer and holds team records in the backstroke and individual medley (I.M.)

O'Neill is looking for a very strong placing in the Big East from the women's team. Last year's fifth place finish credited in part to the co-captains, Krisa Jensen and Deborah DeLoe, along with Kate Bradley '90, all breaststrokers who placed in the Big East Championships.

"We've got a real good foundation for a good swimming and diving program", says O'Neill. This is evidenced by returning freestyler and I.M. swimmer Horace "Wayne" Bowden, who's looking forward to another record-breaking season.

Captains Mike Burke and Pat Sears have seen incredible improvement in the young squad since participating in the Friar's first Big

East season. Concerning the major improvement that this year's recruits will provide, Burke says, "The great increase in the team's strength in freestyle events gives Coach O'Neill a lot more cards to play with when deciding a winning strategy."

Count on an excellent showing from the women's breaststrokers, including Sharon Parker and Karen Crossman. O'Neill also expects a substantial contribution from walk-ons Cathy Collette and Nicole (a.k.a Spunky) Gasperone who swim backstroke and freestyle. Gasperone is also a strong butterfly swimmer, a definite asset on the women's team.

Also encouraging for both teams is the return of Theresa "T.J." Agnew. One of the best swimmers in her class, Agnew is now recovering from orthopedic surgery and the team is happy to have her back on the squad.

The Coach's predictions? After the women's team tasted 6th place for a short time during the championships last year, O'Neill is confident that they have the ability to beat UConn and St. John's and finish the season fifth overall. Pittsburgh is expected to win the championship as it has for the last several years, with Villanova in second and Syracuse in third. O'Neill contends that "The rest of the teams (B.C., St. John's, UConn, and Providence) will be in a dogfight for fourth and I hope we're in the thick of it".

As far as the women's team is concerned, O'Neill expects another season of improvement. Counting on a few strong showings from his sophomores to produce a few upset victories before the season is over. Last year's respectable 5th place finish will no doubt be improved upon.

Friars To Watch
Gaylord Garraway '91. The hard-working, highly motivated freshman swims middle distance freestyle and is flexible enough to fulfill the team's needs in M. 200 and 400 meter events. He has a

good chance of breaking a few school records.

Wayne Bowden '89. Top point scorer for the past two years. Definitely a force to be reckoned with in 1650 meter freestyle. Looking to improve his I.M. times as well as shatter a few more records.

Paul Soligan '89. Trained all summer and vastly improved his butterfly times and is intent on improving his 200 butterfly, a grueling event; and in New England in 100m butterfly. 8th in last year's Big East 200m butterfly.

Pat Sears '88. Improving, aspiring to qualify for nationals and confident he can. Back 1 1/2 somersault with 2 1/2 twists.

Dave Sarrazan '90. Incredible improvement. Great athlete full of dives on both boards, 1m and 3m.

Jay Holbrook '89. Holds school record for 50 freestyle. Great team spirit and winning personality contributes greatly to both teams. Participated in 3 relay record breakers.

Lady Friars To Watch

Karen Crossman '91 and Cindi Luciani '90. These two swimmers match up very well in their strengths and are able to work together very positively. Great additions to an already solid team. Luciani holds record for most points scored by an individual in the Big East Championships.

THE COACHES

Entering his fourth year as Aquatics Director and Head Coach of the men's and women's swim teams at Providence College is John O'Neill, who at 24 is the youngest head coach in the Big East Conference.

A native of Cumberland, Rhode Island, John graduated from Springfield College in 1981. That same year he began his coaching career assisting at Brown University, where he saw his Bruins finish third at the Eastern Seaboard Championships with their highest point total in the history of the program. During this time, O'Neill also served a two-year stint as pool director at Rhode Island College. He has served as an assistant at the Little Rhody Aquatic Club, one of the most prestigious swim clubs in the Northeast. He is a member of the American Swim Coaches Association (Level 4), the College Swim Coaches Association and the United States Swimming.

John, who received his Masters Degree in Education from Providence College last year, has been with the PC swim program since its inception four years ago. As Aquatics Director, John is responsible for the day-to-day operation of the Taylor Natatorium and all related activities, including a children's Learn to Swim program, adult lessons, advanced life saving courses and other community activities.

O'Neill and his wife Cindy have two children-Shannon, 2, and four-month-old Thomas. The O'Neills make their home in Cumberland.

Assistant Swimming Coach Barry Fontaine

A native of Worcester, Massachusetts, Barry Fontaine, enters his second year as assistant swimming coach at PC. Fontaine received his bachelor's degree in 1980 from Rhode Island College after having attended Springfield College for two years.

He began building a solid background in aquatics at Springfield serving dual roles-facility supervisor at the Art Linkletter Natatorium and men's and women's meet coordinator at the New England Swimming and Diving Championships. Also in his duties at PC, Barry is the aquatics director at the North Providence Natatorium.

From 1981 to 1984 he was the assistant coach at the Little Rhody Aquatic Club, training pre-competitive swimmers to the junior national level. At the same time, he served as assistant coach at Bay View Academy in East Providence taking over the head coaching position there in 1984. Bay View established a dual meet record of 8-2 that year on a team that included several All-State swimmers.

Head Diving Coach Newell Roberts

Newell Roberts starts up his fourth year as head coach of the men's and women's (Providence College) diving program.

A 1979 graduate of Keen State College, Newell was a four-year varsity letterwinner in swimming and diving there where he achieved All-American honors. Following a successful collegiate career, Roberts, a former high school All-State, returned to Rhode Island where he was named coach of the Little Rhody Diving Club.

In addition to coaching, Newell continues to improve upon his own diving skills competing in the master's division of the National Diving Championships. In 1982, '83 and '84, the Providence native took first place in the one meter board competition. He also performed in diving shows throughout the United States and Canada including the 1984 World's Fair in New Orleans. A resident of Providence, Newell just recently was appointed a full-time position in the New Bedford (Ma) school system.
